TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Paris, May 30th.—If Germany's resistance in the Ruhr is prolonged into next winter France will "at once begin considering means of applying greater pressure", said M. Poincare in concluding yesterday's debate in the Chamber of Deputies. By a vote of 56 to 67 the Chamber granted the June expenses of the occupation and voiced their confidence in the Government. M. Poincare said he was convinced Germany would be unable to resist much longer. "Besides", he added, "it is unwise to let Germany think we are in a hurry. The more we let her think that the longer will be her resistance. Germany has got to come to a settlement she has got to pay. To do that she must reform her finances and prepare a great international loan. She did not do it before the occupation and she will only do it on compulsion."

Paris, May 30th.—5 cases of plague, the last breaking out six days ago, have been reported to the health authorities in the last ten days from Stouen, a suburb, it became known today. Two of the cases were fatal, but the other three are considered cured and the ministry of

Health says the outbreak is apparently ended. The spread of the disease was prevented by immediate isolation of those infected and vaccination of the persons with whom they had come in contact. Those stricken were residents of the slums and are believed to have become infected from a rat.

Paris, May 29th.—Former Captain Deullin, one of France's leading aviators in the great war, was killed today in the fall of a new machine which he was testing at Villa Coudray. During the war Deullin achieved 24 victories over German aeroplanes.

London, May 31st.—In the fourth match of the tour, against Hampshire, yesterday, Hampshire batting first made 143 runs. Francis five for 27, Browne three for 48, Pascall 2 for 38. The West Indians replied with 112 runs. Nunes 8, Holt 12, Chancellor 1, Ince 0, Tarilton 10, Fernandes not out 32, Browne 3, Constantine 0, Pascall 0, Dewhurst one, Francis 14, extras 10. In the second innings Hampshire lost one wicket for no runs. The match will be continued today.

Shanghai, May 30th.—The Rev. Wm. Lenfers, the aged German priest of Lin-chang, who has gone several times to the Psozukum mountains on errands of mercy for the foreigners held by the bandits, has written here a grim account of the reported execution of the 80 Chinese captives before the express train was raided near Suchow and the foreigners kidnapped. Previous to the train hold-up, the bandits were short of food. Because of that the 80 prisoners were said to have been hurled over a precipice to their deaths. Father Lenfers reported that each prisoner was labelled with an identification tag. One woman was thrown over with her child in her arms. Later, the families of the massacred captives were notified and allowed to claim the bodies beneath the cliff.

London, May 30th.—The King and Queen tonight held the first court of the season. It was a brilliant function and altogether there were 700 guests, the affair being mainly diplomatic and official in character. The royal circle was rather small, owing to illness and other causes. The absentees included the Prince of Wales, the Duke and Duchess of York, Viscount Lascelles and Princess Mary and Princess Christian. The latter is dangerously ill from a heart attack following influenza.

Lausanne, May 30th.—The fight for judicial safeguards for foreign residents in Turkey was lost today by the Allies, who accepted Ismet Pasha's proposal. The Allies had long contended that foreign legal advisers should have a veto power over arrests and domiciliary searches in connection with foreign residents and this point came near disrupting the conference today although everyone seemed disposed to conceal that fact.
