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TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Halifax, N. S., July 6th.—Three units of the North Atlantic Squadron, under Vice Admiral Sir Michael Culme Seymour, arrived in port at noon today, for a brief stay. The ships are H. M. S. Calcutta, flagship, H. M. S. Constance and H. M. S. Capetown. The fourth unit of the squadron, H. M. S. Wistaria, is at present at Sydney N. S., having cruised up the St. Lawrence early in the season. It is not known how long the fleet will remain in port, but it is expected that they will go to Pictou for the Hector celebration.

Henley on Thames, July 6th.—Hilton Belyea of St. John N B was eliminated from the competition for the Diamond Sculls today by Gollan, British oarsman.

Henley on Thames, July 6th.—The fight for the Grand Challenge cup, premier trophy of the Henley Regatta, was resumed today with the rowing of a heat in which Brasenose College, Oxford stroke, by W. P. Mellon of Garden City N. Y. was eliminated from the contest. The Thames rowing club put the Oxonians out of the competition after a hard struggle, finishing three quarters of a length ahead, in the fast time of six minutes 58 seconds.

Wimbledon, July 6th.—Suzanne Lenglen of France retained her title as woman lawn tennis champion of the world by defeating Miss Kathleen McKane, first ranking English woman in the finals of the Wimbledon tournament today. The French star won in straight sets at 6-3, 6-2.

London, July 6th.—Mr. Stanley Baldwin, replying to a question in the House of Commons yesterday, said the United

States had indicated no willingness to call a conference for the limitation of air forces. He added that the objection which he outlined on Monday applied equally to a conference limited to a few of the powers. The Premier's declaration of Monday was, "in my view it would be premature to hope for the successful issue of such a conference until a number of outstanding matters which remain unsettled in Europe are settled."

London, July 6th.—Marshal Foch will attend the ceremony of unveiling the memorial at St. Julien commemorative of the first battle of Ypres in which the Canadian army resisted the first German attacks. The unveiling will take place on Sunday and will be performed by Field Marshal H. R. H. The Duke of Connaught.

London, July 6th.—The House of Bishops yesterday discussed a measure to abolish a grievance of Anglican clergymen ordained in the Dominions, such clergy coming under the restrictions of the Colonial Clergy Act of 1874 which disqualified them from acting as clergy in England, unless they serve a period of probation, pay certain fees and make declarations which are often resented. The Archbishop of Canterbury moved the remedial resolution and said the bishops in England wanted to make it clear that they welcomed men ordained abroad. The Bishop of Durham sounded a note of criticism, saying men who failed on educational grounds to secure ordination in England might go abroad to be ordained and then come back here. The Archbishop of Canterbury replied that every individual case would be enquired into. Much would depend on letters the clergyman carried from his Bishop. Several stated that the bishops in England sent to the Dominions clergy who were inferior intellectually and morally.
