TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Rome, July 4th.—Signor Bonomi, who was intrusted with the task of forming a new cabinet to succeed that of Signor Giolitti, which resigned last week, has constituted the new ministry. Signor Bonomi is Premier and Minister of the Interior. He will also take the ministry of Foreign Affairs until the Marquis Dellatorre, to whom the portfolio was offered, has accepted or refused the office. The cabinet is composed of the centrist elements, Signor Bonomi having excluded both the extreme left and right and the nationalists and soc.

London, July 5th.—The Turkish Nationalists have occupied almost the entire Ismail peninsula and some of them have entered the neutral zone, says an Exchange Telegraph despatch from Constantinople today. It is said that a private meeting of the Allied High Commissioners in Constantinople discussed the question of asking Rumania to send troops to defend Constantinople against the Nationalists if necessary, the despatch adds.

Washington, July 5th. The cruiser Cleveland and the gunboat Sacramento have been ordered to Tampico, Mexico, to protect United States interests in the event that they are jeopardized because of labour troubles growing out of the unemployment situation, it was said today at the Navy Department.

Stockholm, July 5th.—Asiatic cholera is spreading rapidly in the whole of European Russia, according to the public recorder. There were 16,000 cases reported up to June 25th. Towns are more subject to the infection than rural districts. Recently Petrograd and Moscow

have been infected, the disease spreading quickly and being propagated by the unusually hot weather and by refugees who have fled from the famine districts. According to the "Rosi", a news agency in Moscow, all the imperial castles and country houses of the nobility in the Crimea will be converted into hospitals.

London, July 5th.—Sir Robert Horne, Chancellor of the Exchequer, announced in the House of Commons today that he had decided to offer for subscription an issue of 5½% treasury bonds, maturing April 1st, 1929, with the price of issue fixed at 97.

London, July 5th. Problems of military air defence engaged the attention of the Dominion Prime Minister today. Field Marshal Sir Henry Wilson and Air Marshal Sir Hugh M. Trenchard supported by a formidable coterie of experts and officials, made lengthy statements outlining the empire's position respecting both land and air. Questions were asked and answered and the committee, on which Canada is represented by Mr. Hugh Guthrie, Minister of Militia and Defence, was empowered to further inquire into both subjects and report back to the conference later on. As the action thus taken may lead to the belief that the conference contemplates some decisive action in respect of defence, the Canadian press correspondent is in a position to state that nothing more is expected of it than the usual pious resolution that has marked practically every imperial conference during the last twenty years, the dominion Premiers have made perfectly plain that matters of Naval and Military policies, so far as they concern the dominions, must be decided not in London, but by the respective local parliaments.

London, July 1st.—Sugar in stock on the 2nd. inst. was 286,000 tons. Last year 143,000 tons.
