LOCAL.

The price of cattle is going down in Porto Rico where cattle raising, once a meagre industry, is being developed to the extent that importation of stock will soon become a thing of the past. The dealers of the Virgin Islands, or, more correctly speaking St. Croix, found a lucrative market for their cattle in Porto Rico and until recently commanded 11 cents a pound on the hoof. Now the most the Porto Ricans will pay is 7 cents a pound live weight. This revolution in the meat market will naturally have the effect of readjusting prices on live stock and meat locally, since the price abroad was the basis for fixing the local price. Beef of

the most ordinary grade fetches up to 30 cents a pound under the existing rates fixed by the Food Commission very long ago, and the prospect of seeing it go down to the mutual advantage of consumer and butcher alike is indeed pleasing. The butchers have had a hard time supplying the island with meat and keeping their business above water, and all hands are due a speedy return to normalcy.

It is regretted to report the explosion of a gasoline lamp at the Apothecary last night and slight injuries to Mr. Bøje whose heroic action in carrying the flaming lamp outside where it exploded averted probably a catastrophe. It appears the lamp grew overheated and blazed. The electric current had previously gone out and this lamp which otherwise gives good service had to be put in operation.

TELEGRAM.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Geneva, Dec. 17th. - For the first time since the session of the Assembly of the League of Nations opened here last month the Canadian delegation today found support from the British delegation on a contested question, when the H. n. Mr. Rowell pleaded Albania's cause successfully. Albania was elected a member of the League of nations at this session. During yesterday's voting the British Empire was divided on nearly every question Canada and South Africa voting against Great Britain on the admission of Georgia, Canada voting South Africa and Great Britain regarding Armenia, and Australia abstaining from voting when the application of Bulgaria was before the Assembly.

Athens, Dec. 19th. - King Constantine arrived in Athens this morning and was greeted by cheering thousands.

London, Dec. 19th. - The Government has decided to instruct the British Minister in Athens to have no official relations with Constantine it was announced yesterday.

Paris, Dec. 19th. - The Foreign Office announced last evening that the French Minister in Athens would leave the Greek capital today.

London, Dec. 19th. Two men who had been in the custody of the military in constabulary barracks at Cashel Tipperary were shot dead on Saturday night. No details have yet been received.

London, Dec. 19th. - An official representative of the Ministry of Labour stated on Saturday that provision would be made for 225,000 unemployed for the coming 19 weeks.
