Collect On Delivery Mail Should Be Redeemed Promptly.

THE C. O. D. service between the United States and this office is growing steadily, and during the past six months has increased at least 60%. This is good business, and it is appreciated. However, recent experience indicates that there is developing considerable laxity in the redemption of C. O. D. parcels, due no doubt to the fact that patrons of this service have gained the understanding that they have 30 days in which to claim such mail, and that it will be returned to sender at the expiration of 30 days without any obligation or expense attaching to the addressee. To import goods, have the senders prepay postage and C. O. D. fee, and eventually fail to redeem such importations, necessitating the collection of return-postage from senders, and imposing needless labor on the postal service in handling and re-handling of such matter, is obviously to take an undue advantage of the privileges offered by the C. O. D. service, and it is desired to bring this situation strongly to the notice of those concerned that the undesirable practice may be corrected immediately. At the same time all patrons of the C. O. D. service are advised that only in cases where senders do not restrict delivery to a fewer number of days will C. O. D. parcels be held 30 days at office of delivery. When senders fix a certain time-limit, not less than 3 nor more than 30 days, C. O. D. matter will be treated accordingly. It is not understood why merchandise would be imported if not wanted, or before it is needed and can be redeemed, and it is sincerely hoped that delinquents who have received first and second notices of the arrival of C. O. D. parcels will appreciate the desirability of removing them promptly.
