A SAD PROUD RECORD.

Paris Which Lost 300 Volunteers In The War.

The Bishop of Leeds will unveil tomorrow the most striking war memorial to the fallen to be found in the city. In St. Patrick's Catholic Church, East Leeds (one of the poorest parts of the city,) a memorial altar has been erected, and so touching is it that queues of work people from the neighbouring factories have gathered in the church during the dinner hour to gaze on the inspiring work.

The arresting feature is a centre panel in coloured mosaic depicting the crucified Saviour with a fallen soldier lying at the foot of the cross, so artistically done that many have been moved to tears.

At either side of the altar is a panel containing the names of the fallen soldiers in the parish. There are over 300 names, and not a conscript amongst them. Indeed, every eligible man of the congregation had volunteered for service before conscription was introduced. The altar has cost nearly £1,000, every penny of which has been subscribed while a fund has also been founded for perpetual masses for the souls of the fallen.—*Extract.—Dominica Guardian, July 22nd.*
