New York, June 20th.—Definite steps to close the doors of many stockbrokerage houses, against which complaints have been received, will be taken to the Supreme Court tomorrow and injunctions against various brokers will be asked.

Manchester, June 20th.—The Syracuse University Lacrosse team defeated Stockport, the English club champions, 5 to 4 yesterday.

London, June 21st.—After a three days rest the touring West Indian cricket team yesterday met the Derbyshire XI at Buxton. The West Indians went in to bat first and scored 97, as follows: Chancellor 2 runs, Nunes 13, Fernandes 5, Ince 2, Holt 0, Hunte 1, Small 1, Constatine (not out) 60, Browne 2, Pascall 7, Francis 4, total 97. Derbyshire going in to bat was disposed of for a score of 75 as follows: Oliver 0, Bowden 1, Storer 0, Jackson 27, Hutchinson 4, Cadman 20, Tomlinson 1, Townsend 2, Morton 0, Elliott (not out) 5, Bestwick 15, total 75.

Bowling for the West Indians, Francis took one wicket for five runs, Browne four for 42, and Pascall three for 28. The West Indian team commenced their second innings and close of play had scored 10 for the loss of one wicket. Scores were Chancellor 5, Nunes (not out) 5, Fernandes (not out) 0, total 10.

Elberfeld, June 20th.—Passive resistance would be abandoned in the Rhine valley tonight on certain conditions, one of the most important of which is indemnification by the French and the Belgians for all products of private industry which they have seized, says a memorandum to the Berlin Government reported to have been drafted here by representatives of the employers and employees authorized to act in the matter. Other stipulations are the removal of the Franco-Belgian railway administration, the return of all persons deported and the release of those persons imprisoned, the renunciation of all measures of force, the nullification of all restrictive control methods, the restoration of the telephone and telegraph service and indemnification for all wounded and the families of those killed.

Weimer, June 20th.—United devotion to the Fatherland was the key note of an address delivered by Franz Ebert, the

German President, to 1,000 public school teachers and pupils assembled here from all parts of the country, including the Rhineland and the Ruhr, for the National festival play. "You are the hope and the future of the Fatherland, for whose sake we are bearing the burdens of the present in patient perseverance", President Ebert told the children in his audience. The President led the cheers "Heil Deutschland" and in the singing of "Deutschland Uber Alles."

Belgrade, June 20th.—King Boris of Bulgaria, restored to prestige by the overthrow of Stamboulsky's Govt., has become engaged to Princess Ileana, youngest daughter of the King and Queen of Roumania, according to Bucharest advices. Roumania consequently has recognized the revolutionary Zankoff Government of Bulgaria, which at first was regarded with suspicion. The Greek Government has instructed its Charge D'Affaires at Sofia to continue diplomatic relations with Bulgaria.

London, June 20th.—Out of the mystery behind which Mr. Bonar Law's physicians and immediate friends are hiding his physical condition, come continued reports of critical developments, which are not yielding to treatment. The belief is general that the throat trouble which seemed insignificant in the beginning, is due to cancer. His doctors will not make any official statement either in confirmation or denial of this, but it is said that his condition is not giving any immediate anxiety.

Christiania, June 21st.—Captain Amundsen, the explorer, who recently abandoned his proposed flight across the North Pole by aeroplane, is returning to the United States on the schooner Holmes, according to a despatch from Nome, Alaska. The despatch says Amundsen's plane was damaged in a trial flight.

Catania, June 21st. Reports from the mount Etna region early today said there had been a slight decrease in the intensity of the eruption, while the explosions within the crater were less frequent.

Catania, June 21st.—There is a new and strong emission of lava from Mount Etna. The town of Linguaglossa, which has been threatened for the last few days, is almost certainly safe from destruction, say official reports from the devastated region. The force of the eruption is slowly but steadily decreasing. The progress of the lava is more sluggish and wide tracts which have already hardened are forming, to some extent, barriers to the fresh outflow.

Budapest, June 21st.—A royalist conspiracy has been discovered by the police. The conspirators are members of a secret society known as the "Petoefy Guards". It is alleged they had plotted to overthrow the Government of Count Stefan Bethlen and proclaim a monarchy, with Prince Otto, son of the late King Charles, as ruler. About 20 persons have been arrested in connection with the plot.
