ST. CROIX STATION.

Paris May 6th.—Georges Carpentier knocked out Marcel Nilles in the eight round of their scheduled 15 round bout for the French heavyweight title this afternoon. Although he won, Carpentier, according to ringside observers, added nothing to his reputation. It was noticeable that the old Carpentier spirit was lacking. Georges was in difficulties as early as the second round and weathered the third only through the inexperience and lack of combativity of his opponent. The experts opined that Carpentier's attempt to stage a come-back, although it ended in a victory for him, failed to demonstrate any of the fighting qualities required of a champion and that had the former French idol been facing a real battle, the fight would have been ended in the second round, with Georges the loser. 40,000 people witnessed the contest.

St. Johns, N. F. May 6th.—The returns received from the various districts over the weekend showed eight men elected for the Squires Government and nine for the opposition. This is exactly the same as the standing of the two parties in the last general election and in respect to the same section of the country. The return of the Squires Government to power, with about the same majority as before is generally predicted. The sections still to be heard from include those where the fishermen's protective union predominates politically. As was the case in 1919, this organization is allied with the Squires liberal party and is counted on by the Government to add eleven seats to those already secured by the prime

Dublin, May 7th.—Irregulars on Saturday night attacked the resident at Dundrum, near Dublin, of Senator Fitzgerald, owner of the Freeman's Journal. A sentry guarding the house called upon three women to halt, whereupon according to the report, they fired revolvers at him. The attack on the house lasted an hour and a half, but beyond many broken windows there was little damage.
