TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Ottawa, Jan. 21st.—The "Citizen" of yesterday printed the following: Before going into any scheme for an imperial system of wireless communications for press and commercial purposes the proposal of which is being reviewed in London, the Canadian Government it was stated today, will await the outcome of experiments being made on a part of the circuit in new methods of transmission. The plan was originated before the war but was cancelled last year. A British parliamentary committee proposed a chain of stations from England to West and South Africa, India, Singapore and Australia. The question of communication with Canada was left open to ascertain the Canadian Government's views. The British Government is going ahead with the first link and it was stated here today that the proposal will likely stay in the air until the outcome of the experiments is known.

New York, Jan. 21st. Raw sugar was steady today at 4 3/4 for Cuba's equal to 5.39 for centrifugal. Sales reported were 18,000 bags of Cuba's for prompt shipment and 6,500 bags of Porto Rico's for February shipment for local refiners. Refined was steady at 7.75 for fine granulated. Some refiners reported a fair inquiry but others said the market was less active. Futures were firmer on covering with offering slight. A noon prices were six to nine points higher.

New York, Jan. 21st.—Mr. Rockefeller jr., son of the Standard Oil magnate, has contributed \$1,000,000 to the relief of starving European children. This announcement was made tonight by Mr. Hoover at the conclusion of a dinner giving to Mr. Rockefeller's Bible Class.

London, Jan. 22nd.—The "Daily Mail" says that Father Mannix of Charleville, County Cork, cousin of Archbishop Mannix of Australia, has been arrested.
