brought the matter to the attention of the British and French Governments. His Holyness considers that the Genoa Conference will afford an excellent opportunity to decide the question, and requests the Spanish delegates to bring it before the Conference, as though on behalf of the Pope.

Paris, April 9th.—Princess Mary and Viscount Lascelles left at noon yesterday for London, their honeymoon trip on the Continent having been completed.

Indianapolis, April 9th.—The idle coal miners in the county started yesterday and will continue next week to receive their last pay estimated at thirty million dollars by the Union officials. This large wage distribution, an important factor in the miners ability to continue the general suspension of work which began a week ago on an order from the United Mine Workers of America, is for the final half of March and is several times the total cash resources of the union organizations, national, state and local, and comes to the miners with an indefinite period of idleness ahead of them. It will be the only large cash payment to come to them during the suspension of work, the Union's "war chest" not permitting of any general strike benefits. Some of the anthracites miners were kept on full miners time for March, and the bituminous last pay was among the best sums the men received for several months.

Paris, April 9th.—Professor Einstein, who arrived here some time ago for a series of conference on his theory of relativity, left today for Berlin.

Berlin, April 8th.—General Von Falkenhayn, formerly Minister for War and Chief of the General Staff of the German Army died today at his residence near Potsdam.

Athens, April 9th.—Notwithstanding the efforts of the Allies to arrange an armistice, serious fighting has taken place on the front in Asia Minor, between the Turkish and Greek forces in the course of which two Greek soldiers were killed and fourteen wounded. While an official report states that numerous Turkish dead, including an officer, have been seen before the Greek positions.

Dublin, April 9th.—Mr. Michael Collins, Chief of the Provisional Government, declared today in the course of a speech that if an immediate change did not take place in the tone and tactics of certain persons, civil war probably could only be averted by a miracle, and he added that, in such a case, it could be expected that England would return to restore the order which Irishmen would have shown themselves incapable of maintaining. The stopping of trains and other attempts to prevent meeting in favour of the treaty continued today. The railway were removed on one road by which it was supposed Mr. Collins would arrive and armed men prevented the workmen from replacing them, but Mr. Collins had foiled his adversaries by travelling during the night.

Madrid, April 10th.—An important victory in Morocco is officially reported by General Berrenguer, the Spanish Commander, which will allow of the

occupation of much insurgent territory and from which important political results will follow.

Genoa, April 10th.—The arrival of the French delegation to the conference was the occasion of a great demonstration in favour of France, the playing of the Marseillaise adding to the enthusiasms. The Associated Press correspondent is informed that the French delegates are determined to do everything possible to bring about the reforms needed by Europe and that they admit that the Russian problem dominates all others, France has not come to Genoa with any repugnance towards reducing the effectiveness of her army, provided that suitable guarantees are given, and she desires to cooperate with the United States, which country it is hoped to see take a practical interest in the economic affairs of Europe. Mr. Child, the United States Ambassador, will assist at the meetings of the conference as an observer. The Allies, Germany and Russia will each have five delegates and the other powers two each. The opening address today will be delivered by Mr. Lloyd George and M. Barthou. Commissions will be appointed to examine the powers of the delegates the question of Russia and financial, transportation and economic questions.

London, April 10th.—After several weeks trial the well-known financier E. T. Hooley, was sentenced at the Central Criminal Court on Saturday to three years penal servitude, for conspiracy to defraud persons, who he induced to buy shares of the Jubilee Cotton Mills. Of five other defendants, two including Mr. Fletcher, an ex-Mayor of Derby, were acquitted, while Mr. Demery, a land agent, and Mr. Wallis, a solicitor, were sentenced to twelve and ten months, respectively, in the second division, the judges also taking under consideration a suggestion that the latter should be struck off the role. Mr. Mac Donald, ex-Mayor of Folkestone was recommended for mercy and collapsed in the dock. He was bound over in the sum of five thousand pounds Bankruptcy proceedings are still pending against Hooley, whose liabilities following a recent meeting of his creditors were returned as six hundred and eighty seven thousand pounds, with assets amounting to twenty five thousands. Mr. H. F. Dickens K. C., a son of Charles Dickens, the novelist in the course of a three days summing up of the evidence, said Hooley had never been a director of the company but had pulled the strings throughout.

Tokio, April 10th.—Naval treaty ratio, as agreed upon at the Washington conference, has been declared sufficient for the defence of the Empire by Admirals of the Japanese Navy, after deliberation thereon.

Belgrade, April 10th.—King Alexander, who has been confined to his room since Wednesday last is stated to be better.
