TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Dublin, Nov. 20th.—The Habeas Corpus proceedings, brought in behalf of Mr. Erskine Childers, were adjourned this afternoon until tomorrow, the Master of the Rolls directing that no order of the military court be executed, pending a decision by the civil tribunal. When the case came up before the Master of the Rolls, the judge on being told that the Govt. had refused to give the names of the 8 men under arrest, in addition to Mr. Childers, declared that such a refusal was an attempt to nullify Habeas Corpus rights and if persisted in, he would regard the provisional Govt's. action as a device to oust the court from jurisdiction. Counsel for the prisoners requested a stay of execution, but the judge replied that he had no jurisdiction. The court asked the counsel for the Govt. if he would give an undertaking that the execution of the men would not be carried out, if the court was adjourned. Counsel replied that he was unable to give such an undertaking.

Belfast, Nov. 21st.—The Ulster authorities have deported from Belfast about forty Protestants, whose presence they thought detrimental to the city's peace.

Thus far, nothing concerning the deportation has been divulged in any of the newspapers. Relatives of the deportees are deeply irritated. Most of those deported are listed in the York street area, the others being from an eastern suburb of Belfast.

London, Nov. 21st.—Mr. James Ramsay MacDonald, Member of Parliament for the Aberavon division of Glamorgan-shire, the long prominent as a Labour leader, was today elected leader of the Parliamentary Labour Party.

Washington, Nov. 21st.—Republican members of the Merchant Marine Committee have agreed on an agreement to the ship subsidy bill, designed to offset losses to United States passenger ships engaged in foreign service by reason of prohibition against the sale of liquor. The amendment provides that such ships shall be paid, directly, by the Govt. for carrying mail, instead of turning the amount due into a revolving fund, out of which all companies are to receive compensations.

Paris, Nov. 20th.—Mr. Lemieux, speaker of the Canadian House of Commons, was received by President Miller and discussed with him the plans for the erection of Canadian war memorials in France. It has been decided to erect five such memorials in France and three in Belgium. Brig-General Hughes and Lieutenant-Col. Osborn are associated with Mr. Lemieux in the work.

Demerara, Nov. 21st.—The seaplane Sampaio Correia arrived at Suddie Essequibo river about seventy miles from Georgetown yesterday at 4.50 p. m. and spent the night there. 9.30 a. m. 21st not yet reached Georgetown. Very rainy.

Demerara, Nov. 21st.—Sampaio Correia arrived Georgetown 11.30 a. m., voyage from Trinidad to Suddie pleasant and eventless, took five hours five minutes, a distance of 303 miles.

London, Nov. 21st.—Sugar in stock on the 18th. inst. was 106,000 tons. Last year 47,000.

Constantinople, Nov. 21st.—The investiture of Abdul Medjid Effendi, as Caliph, has been postponed until Friday.

Shanghai, Nov. 21st.—The bandit army of Honan province, 30,000 strong, which had kidnapped a number of foreign missionaries recently, is laying waste a path six miles wide across the province, burning every city, town and farm house in its line of march and leaving its trail strewn with dead bodies, according to a letter received here from an English missionary, who escaped.

New York, Nov. 21st.—Indignant United States citizens have protested to the New York office of the Federal Department of Justice, against permitting Lieutenant Von Moltke, second in command to Captain Muller in the famous German raider Emden, to lecture in the United States. Von Moltke landed Saturday and went to Chicago to start his tour. Those who object to Von Moltke,
