TELEGRAMS

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, Sept. 13th. — A weekly despatch in a Sunday paper states that Lord Milner who is wanting a rest, will shortly retire from the Colonial Office. Downing Street, however, denies knowledge, and points out that Lord Milner is not likely to think of retirement until his Egyptian Government scheme has been realized.

Rome, Sept. 14th. — Troops belonging to the forces of Dannunzio have occupied the islands of Arbe Cherso and Veglia in the Gulf of Quarnerno, southwest of Fiume, according to reports received here. Italian soldiers comprising the garrison on the islands are said to have joined the Dannunzio volunteers.

London, Sept. 14th. — Serious anti-Bolshevik rioting is taking place in Petrograd, it is declared in reports from that city received in Berlin, says a despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Co. from the German capital. Six of the Bolshevik commissioners, it is asserted in these advices, have been drowned in the Neva.

London, Sept. 14th. — There are strong indications that France and Belgium, backed by the White House, are engineering a plan to repudiate the Spa agreement and that a commission of Allied and German experts will meet at Geneva to settle the reparations question. It is reported France wants a postponement of the Geneva meeting which is set for September 24th. France, through a new military economic treaty with Belgium, has the latter's support to leave the reparations issue entirely in the hands of the Reparation Commission appointed under the treaty of Versailles. While it is thought the United States will concur in this, Great Britain and Italy are bitterly opposed. It is expected negotiations will be started soon to get France to stand by the concessions made at Spa. An announcement by the French and Belgian officials of the League that they will not file copies of the recent treaty, is creating no little adverse criticism, and it is being felt that this is in direct opposition to the declaration of the League, urged by President Wilson.

London, Sept. 14th. — The most arresting fact in the coal strike situation is the bold condemnation of the miners' demand for a reduction in coal prices by Thomas Spencer, one of their own leaders. The miners argue that enormous profits are being made by the owners, but official figures show that in the quarter ending June only five areas show any profit and the total was only 8,000,000 sterling.

London, Sept. 14th. — Negotiations for the settlement of the Irish question which are described as the most promising as yet initiated, will be nullified if Mr. MacSweeney dies, says the Dublin correspondent of the Times. Secret negotiations on the basis of full government within the empire have been going on during the last three weeks between the most prominent leaders of modern opinion and influential Republicans, he declared. The Moderates have at last been told, he adds, that nothing further can be done while MacSweeney is near death and if the Lord Mayor dies, the last hope of settlement on the proposed basis will disappear. The appointment of an additional Under Secretary for Ireland, has been decided upon by the Government. It will be his duty to deal with all problems which may arise in the six counties of the province of Ulster the Unionist stronghold in Ireland.

London, Sept. 14th. — Bolshevik troops are advancing toward the Afghan frontier from Bokhara, says a despatch to the Daily Mail. Afghan troops, it is said, have been hastily despatched to assist the Governments of Afghanistan and Turkistan in protecting their frontier.
