The s. s. Bridgetown from New York visited this port yesterday, discharged cargo and a small mail, and sailed for the islands at 6.00 p. m. carrying mail for most the ports of the Leeward and Windward groups, etc.

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION

Tokio, Dec. 13th.—Hirohito, the Prince regent, is seriously ill with measles. At noon today his temperature was 104.9 and his pulse 108. The Prince's illness is following the usual course of measles and there are no complications.

Dublin, Dec. 13th.—Lord Glenavy, formerly Sir James Campbell, was elected chairman of the Free State Senate yesterday. Lord Glenavy was formerly the Irish Lord Chancellor and in pre-war days was a warm supporter of the Ulster policy. Senator Douglas, who was elected Vice chairman, moved the appointment of a committee, to work for the immediate cessation of hostilities throughout the Free State. Mrs. Stopford Green seconded the motion and the resolution was unanimously adopted.

London, Dec. 13th.—An epidemic of typhus of a virulent type is sweeping through the district of Innis in the north-west part of the county of Mayo and whole families have been wiped out, according to a Ballina despatch to the Daily Express. There has been nothing like it since the time of the Great Irish famine.

Peking, Dec. 13th.—Anton Lundeen, the American Missionary, who was kidnapped by bandits in Honan province on October 13th last, has been released. Three other Americans are still being held captive and the diplomatic corps here has appointed a commission which will start for Honan province to negotiate their release.

Dublin, Dec. 13th.—National troops made a clean sweep of the entire Fermoy area during the last week, according to an official report issued yesterday. Many irregulars were captured, together with their arms and equipment and considerable stolen property was recovered. The report says there are now no irregular activities in the Eastern area, which includes Fermoy and Youghal in Eastern County, Cork, and Lismore, County Waterford.

Paris, Dec. 13th.—The Cabinet this morning approved the attitude taken on the reparations question by M. Poincare at the recent London conference of Premiers, after hearing M. Poincare's report of the meeting. It also expressed agreement with him regarding the declarations to be made in the Chamber of Deputies on Friday, when it is expected the Govt. will be called upon to reply to an interpellation.

Rome, Dec. 13th.—Italy is suffering from an exceptionally cold wave. Five persons have been frozen to death in Rome and several similar cases are reported from other cities. The Apennine
