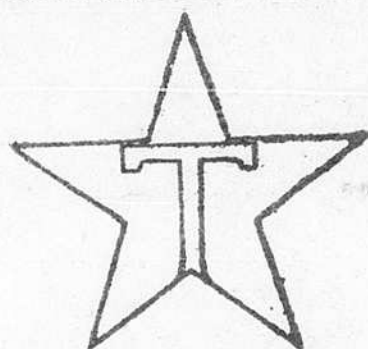

London, Aug. 21st. Fears are expressed here that events in Mesopotamia will involve Great Britain in a costly military campaign. Official reports show that the country is in a state of anarchistic rebellion against the British administration, particularly northeast and west of Bagdad, and between Bagdad and Mosul. Warsaw, Aug. 21st.—The Poles captured 15,000 Soviet prisoners up to Thursday, it was announced here today.

Halifax, N. S., Aug. 21st.—The recent slump of 12 cents per pound on the New York raw sugar market, has not yet affected prices for refined sugar here, but dealers predict a gradual reduction eventually. Sugar still costs the retailer \$24.10 per hundred pound bag and is sold to the consumer at 26 and 25 cents per pound. Most of the local retailers bought heavily before the last advance of three dollars per bag and are now well stocked. "The market is very uncertain," said a leading Halifax wholesaler today, "And somebody is going to suffer or has suffered a tremendous loss, as a result of the New York decline. The sugar mar-
