TELEGRAMS

ST. CROIX STATION.

Riga, Oct. 14th.—The Bolsheviki and the Poles have concluded an agreement whereby Poland obtains concessions from Russia with regard to the product of the iron mines of the Ukraine. This question caused some delay in the preliminary negotiations between them.

Havana, Oct. 14th.—The banks of this city has received funds amounting to six million dollars.

London, Oct. 14th.—Mr. Mac Sweeney, Lord Mayor of Cork, passed the night in a state of extreme weakness. The bulletin of the Irish League states that he has now completed sixty two-days of his hunger strike.

Paris, Oct. 14th.—The Echo De Paris announces that an exchange of views continues between France and England on the subject of the Vilna incident, but that the two Governments have apparently agreed that the Warsaw Govt. was not responsible for the affair and that a solution will be found by the League of Nations. In the meantime, the two countries have decided to send a joint note to Poland, recommending moderation on the subject, and the "Petit Parisien" says it has already been dispatched to Warsaw.

Paris, Oct. 14th.—Admiral Fournier has communicated to the Academy of Science an invention by M. Loth, a French engineer, consisting of the use of an electrically illuminated cable to allow ships to locate the entrance to ports during dense fogs. The Minister of Marine, who witnessed the trials, has decided to install such a cable at the entrance of all

ports, and according to the "Matin", there is even a question of placing a luminous cable across the Channel to facilitate maritime communication between France and England during the winter.

Warsaw, Oct. 14th.—The new occupation of Vilna by the Poles has created intense enthusiasm throughout the country, the population showing great appreciation of Genl. Beligowski who has restored to Poland this pearl of her territory.

Notice To The Public

SANITARY RULES
regarding the sale of bread, cakes, pies, pastries and candies in the towns of Christiansted and Frederiksted, Municipality of St. Croix.

UNDER the provision of paragraph 28, Sanitary Regulations for the towns of Christiansted and Frederiksted, Municipality of St. Croix, of January 30, 1886 authorizing the Board of Health to control the sale of provisions and by the authority placed in the Chief Sanitation Officer by the Governor to assume the functions of the Board of Health, the following measures are hereby set forth to take effect November 1st, 1920:

Bread, cakes, pies, pastries and candies offered for sale or kept for the purpose of being sold must be protected from flies, dirt and dust at all times.

All persons engaged in making bread, cakes, pies, pastries and candies for sale, must do so in room so screened that is absolutely fly-proof, such room not to be used as a bed-room, living room, or for any purpose other than the making of bread, pies, cakes, pastries and candies.

It is forbidden to allow dogs, cats, chickens, ducks and all other animals in any room used for the purpose of making bread, cakes, pies, pastries and candies.

All persons engaged in the preparation, handling or sale of such provisions as enumerated above, must be free from disease, wear clean clothes and have clean hands, including clean finger nails.

All shops, stores and stands keeping any of the above enumerated provisions for sale must do so in a screened container that is absolutely fly-proof.

All provisions as enumerated above not prepared, kept or sold in accordance with the above rules will be considered as injurious to health and will be destroyed as provided for in paragraph 28 of the Sanitary Regulations for the towns of Christiansted and Frederiksted, Municipality of St. Croix of January 30, 1886.
