Police Notice.

THE following excerpt from paragraph 37, Police Regulations for St. Croix, is hereby brought to public notice for the information of all concerned:

"The police are entitled to take up dogs found without a dog stamp, and if no one redeems them within three times 24 hours, the Police can order them to be killed. The same applies to dogs roaming about the streets from 10.00 p. m. to 6.00 a. m., and also to bitches in rutting time."

Beginning Monday, November 7, 1921, the above regulation in regards to dogs will be rigidly enforced and all dogs found unlawfully on the streets will be taken over by the Police.

Dog stamps can be procured at any time from the Police Headquarters.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE COLONIAL COUNCIL FOR ST. CROIX.

3rd Member for Frederiksted Country District (M. M. Skeoch) remarked: Mr. Chairman. It is a pity that the other applications pending were not given consideration and an amount included in this Money Bill for the installation of the phones applied for.

The Acting Chairman (Blackwood) remarked: I don't know that this is a fault we can lay on any one; if the applicants had followed the matter up they certainly would find out the cause why their phones were not installed.

3rd Member for Frederiksted Country District (M. M. Skeoch) would like to know why the amount on the Money Bill now before the House cannot be increased?

3rd Member for Christiansted Town (Alexander) remarked: Mr. Chairman. The point raised by the Honorable 2nd Member for Christiansted Town is quite in order. If the Honorable Government Secretary would bring in an amendment increasing the amount, that would settle the whole question.

2nd Member for Christiansted Town (Canegata) remarked: Mr. Chairman. I agree with the Honorable 3rd Member for Christiansted Town on one point, but not on the other. It is not left to the Government Secretary to bring in an amendment. Why not pass the Money

Bill which is now before us and trust to the Telephone Manager?

3rd Appointed Member (Armstrong) remarked: Mr. Chairman. I have made inquiries and found that no applications have been filed for the installation of telephones.

The Acting Chairman (Blackwood) remarked: As far as I know verbal applications have been made. It does not seem to me necessary to increase the amount called for in this Money Bill. If there are other applicants Money bills can be introduced.

The Acting Chairman (Blackwood) would like to know from whom the Honorable 3rd Appointed Member received information that no written applications were made for the installation of telephones?

3rd Appointed Member (Armstrong): From the Telephone Manager.

It was proposed by 1st Appointed Member (Henderson), seconded by 4th Member for Frederiksted Country District (Fleming) and carried that 2nd Discussion be closed.

2nd Discussion closed.

The Secretary read the Money Bill and the Acting Chairman put same to the vote.

12 Members voted for; 2 not voting.

The Acting Chairman remarked: The Money Bill is adopted and goes to Government.

At 4 o'clock p. m., the Chairman brought up item 2; and as agreed upon heretofore, the doors were closed and the matter was taken under discussion.

During the discussion an amendment to the resolution was proposed and adopted.

After some discussion the resolution was read as amended and put to the vote and unanimously adopted.

At 6.45 p. m., the doors were opened, and there being no further business before the House the Chairman declared the meeting closed.
