U. S. NAVY PRESS NEWS.

WASHINGTON: A nation-wide round-up by the Department of Justice Officials made on "Reds" ran four thousand five hundred prisoners, of whom half face deportation. Scores of so-called parlor Bolsheviki officials say and they must be dealt with under a strict application of the laws as they are citizens. The round-up included radicals from almost every European country, a few native born Americans and one Chinese. The majority arrested were Russians. Seized documents are reported to show conspiracy to overthrow the government. Soldiers helped police and agents in raids.

CHICAGO: Approximately one-third of the four thousand five hundred radicals arrested last night in Department of Justice's second drive to rid America of forces of anarchy and Bolshevism today are in the jails. Detroit and Chicago alone harbor one thousand. Drive directed against communist organizations and most of prisoners are Russians with sprinkling of Germans.

TOPEKA, KANSAS: What is regarded as an official announcement of Governor Henry White's candidacy for the presidential nomination on a Republican ticket was made here today by William Allen White of Emporia.

LONDON: General Beelikenk's government in Southern Russia has been overthrown and General Ramnovsky has been chosen to replace him. Anti-Bolsheviki Chief will leave Moscow.

WASHINGTON: Navy Department informed that Rear Admiral William P. Day, retired, died at Nice, France, on December 28th.

WASHINGTON: Bids for sale of twenty-nine former German and Austrian passenger ships were asked for yesterday by United States Shipping Board, proposals to be submitted by January 20th. Board stipulates that ships shall be run under American flag. Decided to sell them as it is estimated that fifty million would be the cost of reconstructing them.

PARIS: French Government has granted permission for removal of bodies of twenty-thousand American soldiers buried in cemeteries outside zone of armies and do not include those gathered into American cemeteries in army zone.

PROVIDENCE, RHODE ISLAND: It was announced here last night that Victor Berger's postponed speech will not be permitted. First halted by protest of American Legion Members.
