

Berlin, March 21st.—The negotiations between the delegates of the Govt. and the syndicates have resulted in an agreement comprising the retirement of Herr Noske and Herr Heine, and a number of important social reforms. Work will be resumed on Monday, the association of the syndicates and the leaders of the Unions having issued a manifesto terminating the strike although not completely satisfied. The National Assembly has left Stuttgart for Berlin. Further fighting is reported at Remscheid, Dusseldorf and Leipzig where the Communists pillaged the shops.

St. Thomas, March 23rd.—General Superintendent's Office. The Cableship "Viking", now lying at Para, Brazil, has been chartered by this Company for repairing work on its system and as soon as her commander and staff, who left Liverpool on the nineteenth instant, have joined her, she will sail for Trinidad to receive and instal the deep sea sounding machine of the company's repairing ship "Henry Holmes" which is now undergoing repairs there and then proceed to St. Thomas for cable and cable stores. It is hoped that she will be at work early in May.

We have been informed that the next steamer of the Royal Dutch West India Line, will arrive here from Europe on the 28th inst. It is the intention of the company, to extend the line of communication by calling at Hamburg for general freight etc., and by also taking into the itinerary several Cuban ports, as well as Colon.—*St. Thomas Mail Notes, March 19th.*

very quiet and promising lad, and of good tendencies. His death is, indeed, a sore blow to both his father and mother, towards whom he ever manifested that filial love and respect, indicative of nobility of character.

The casket, draped with "Old Glory," was taken to the Church at 4.15 o'clock, and laid in the centre of the aisle. After a brief service conducted by the Rev. J. F. Pilgrim, during which were sung the hymns "Rock of Ages" and "On the Resurrection Morning," the bier, borne by 8 of his sailor friends from the "Vixen" was taken to and placed upon the motor truck of the U. S. M. C. With the combined Navy Bands under the leadership of Bandmaster Adams, a squad of marines under the command of Serjeant Wood and a body of mess-men under command of Lieutenant Evans, Chief Executive Officer of the "Vixen", followed by the sorrowing members and friends of the family, the procession, under the sad strains of Chopin's Funeral March, wended its way slowly towards the western cemetery, vast crowds lining the route. The Apothecary Hall passed, and with muffled rolling of drums, the cortege solemnly wends its way along. Soon the deep wailing, though nevertheless beautiful strains of the "Dead March in Saul" smites the

air; and so with slow but steady tread, the grave situated at the southern end of the cemetery is reached. Here again the beautiful burial service was read, after which the bands stationed at the Eastern end, and facing west, rendered that dear and old familiar tune "Nearer my God, to Thee." With the Benediction said, the parting salute fired, and the "Last Post" sounded, the vast concourse who had now assembled, began to leave the grounds, followed by the naval and military detachments. Formed into line, they, under the strains of a stirring march wended their way homeward, followed by the usual crowd. Right up and around the southern end of the Emancipation Garden, at which point the Marine and Naval contingents branched off; while the bands continuing their way, swung around the northern end of the square, right into Commandant Gadé, back to headquarters.

We cannot close this brief sketch of the honour paid the remains of one of our "sons of the soil," without expressing to the grief-stricken parents and other members of the bereaved family our deep and heartfelt sympathy at the loss sustained by them.
