

have decided to give Poland all possible military, naval and economic assistance, without delay.

London, August 12th. Great Britain has been officially notified of the recognition by France of the Government of General Baron Prangel as the De Facto Government of Southern Russia and the question is being discussed between the two Governments. Something akin to consternation is evidenced by the Evening Press, over the French action, which is characterized as contrary to British ideas and a menace to Entente relations. Meanwhile the King who was to leave for Scotland to-morrow, has postponed his trip owing to the situation.

Paris, Aug. 12th.—The situation in Mesopotamia continues to be serious, says a Hava's despatch from Beirut. British detachments on the Euphrates are falling back and the garrison of Devanieh, situated on the right bank of the river, about ninety-five miles north-east of Bagdad, has been cut off. Much agitation prevails in the region. Army garages in Bagdad are reported to be in flames when the despatch was filed.

Paris, Aug. 11th.—Paris is in a panic over a crime wave. Murders, pick-pocketing, robberies, forgeries and shop lifting have reached such proportions that the press and the public are uniting to criticize the police. Eight murders, all unsolved, have occurred in the past ten days. The authorities explain that the police force is short 1,800 men and it is difficult to get the men to join because high wages are paid workers elsewhere.

London, August 11th.—Archbishop Mannix has engaged a leading firm of lawyers to test the legality of his seizure and ejection from the "Baltic". The issue will be taken to the courts when the Archbishop will appear as a citizen of Australia, pointing out that thus he will not stultify himself as a supporter of the Irish Republic which is refusing to acknowledge the British jurisdiction. There is a report here that the Archbishop is not really Mannix but De Valera in disguise.

Paris, Aug. 12th.—A great battle is in progress on the Russo-Polish front, upon which hangs the fate of Warsaw according to information reaching the French Foreign Office today.

Paris, Aug. 12th.—Great Britain has communicated officially with France with regard to the differences between the two Governments, it developed from a statement made by the semi-official Hava's Agency today. Both Governments are examining in the most friendly spirit, the differences in view which have occurred between them, but which will not prevent them from continuing their friendly collaboration, it says.

wounded today as he was leaving the Lyons Railway Station for Nice. As the Premier stepped on to a train, two men fired revolvers at him. He was wounded slightly. His assailants were arrested. Venizelos was taking leave of friends, when two swarthy individuals rushed from the crowd, one firing three shots and the other five before they were overpowered. The Premier was reported wounded in the right side and the left arm. His assailants following their arrest, were rescued by the police from the crowd with great difficulty, the mob shouting, "lynch them". Both of the men were severely handled.

Montreal, Aug. 12th.—The most important development, from a shipping standpoint which has occurred in Canada for some time is the conclusion today of an arrangement, whereby the Canada Steamship Lines Ltd. become the sole passenger and freight agents in Canada of the United States Mail Steamship Company, which corporation has recently taken over from the United States Government, a large number of former German passenger and cargo boats and has now commenced operations out of its ports. The fleet of the United States Steamship Co., when completed, will consist of more than 100 steamers and includes such well known passenger ships as the Leviathan, George Washington, Martha Washington, Mount Vernon and President Grant.
