Just here I would like to inform Mr. Lover Of Football, that even a few members of the Dreadnought have been sensible and honest enough as to acknowledge that the game was not a fair one, and also to let him know that the Dreadnought have not defeated the "Christiansted Athletic Association," as it was a little less than half of the members that played. They only were victorious in the game played on New Year's Day. U. S. NAVY PRESS NEWS.
January 2, 1920.

CHICAGO: Two hundred alleged Reds members of seventy Radical organizations, today were in jail as the result of New Year raid, awaiting action. State and Federal officers and raiding parties sought other suspects.

WASHINGTON: The taking of the fourteenth census began today with eighty-five thousand enumerators employed. Every home in the country will be visited in effort to count population of country which is expected to be from one hundred and seven million to one hundred and twelve million.

CHICAGO: Two hundred prisoners in the county jail were forced to witness hanging of convicted murderer this morning. Hardened criminals were placed in cells which surrounded the square in which the scaffold had been erected.

Jailer hopes to use this as means to check crime.

CHARLESTON: The Sea Plane N. C. 4 left here this morning for Rockaway Beach from where, after dismantling, the noted flying craft will be shipped to Washington and placed in the Smithsonian Institute.

NEW YORK: Admiral Jellicoe of the British Admiralty visited the New York Stock Exchange today as the guest of Charles M. Schwab. The visitors were greeted with cheers from the brokers and clerks.

WASHINGTON: Lieutenant Newman flying the Loening Kitten on December twenty-first lost control at an altitude of over fifteen hundred feet and crashed. His injuries are not serious but the plane was a complete wreck. The cause of the accident has not been determined.

LONDON: A pudding sent to a British prisoner of war travelled two thousand miles and was returned to his wife just the day before he came home from demobilization. It was sent to him while he was in the hands of the Germans at Rutleben in September nineteen eighteen.

HONOLULU: A wide spread revolt against the Japanese is imminent in Korea according to the Tokio correspondent of a Honolulu newspaper. The Japanese Chief of Police of Seoul declares that Christian Missionaries are behind the new uprising.

MOBILE: The schooner Jean L. Somerville of Boston anchored in the Mobile River today after an eventful trip from Las Palmas. The ship arrived in command of the wife of the skipper who died at sea. She had nursed her husband and at the same time assumed charge as navigator.

WASHINGTON: One hundred and ninety-seven cases of Pennsylvania and Kentucky bottled in-bond whiskey were seized by the local police and revenue agents in a building on Camp Leach reservation last night.

TELEGRAMS

ST. CROIX STATION.

Ottawa, December 30th. -If the people of Canada want a certain large quantity of yellow sugar which is available for use in the Dominion, they will have to speak for it, according to a notice which, it is understood, is to be sent by the Canadian Trade Commission through various channels. There is a large quantity of yellow sugar available in Canada, but at the present time there appears to be no takers, and this sugar is not being ordered from refiners and wholesale dealers, in whose hands it is lying. However people outside of Canada are anxious to have this sugar exported to them, but the Canadian Trade Commission will not sanction its export, if the people at home will use yellow sugar and thus help out the supply of granulated sugar.

Paris, Dec. 30th. -The Senate today unanimously voted the Government's
