London, Nov. 8th. — Mr. Lloyd George according to further details of his speech at New Castle, in referring to the Govt. said, "I don't like the look of their being born tired because I know their difficulties and I know they will require all the energy, vitality, resolution and alertness at their command. Let them face their difficulties alive. That is all I ask of them. So long as they do that, I will support them, but don't let them say they are weary of their task before they begin, and that they mean to sit still and adopt a purely negative attitude. I want to see as many National Liberals returned as possible, not to embarrass the Govt., but to save them from some of their enemies. They will thank Providence and the electorate of Great Britain that provided them with a body guard of National Liberals that will save them from their Die Hard extremists. Continuing, the ex-Premier said: "I stand on the reparations issue where I stood in the last election. What I said then was that Germany should pay to the limit of her capacity. In these things you must avoid extremes. Find out what Germany can pay, but if there is to be a reduction of the amount, let there be a fair distribution between all of the creditor Nations. Do not let it be at the expense of the British tax payers, who lost just as heavily and sustained damages just as great as the tax payers of other countries. There should be a fair and equal treatment for the Allies". Dealing with the developments in the Near East, Mr. Lloyd George said: "You do not gain

with Orientals, by not standing up to them. The same thing applies to many Occidentals, too. I could tell you of many men who will take advantage if you do not stand up to them but if you do they are the most decent people in the world. Whether in the East or in the West you have to stand firm. It is the only guarantee of peace". Continuing, he declared, he had fought all his life for labour. "I am not against the working man", he said, "but I do implore him not to go down the wrong avenue, seeking a paradise that is not there. Therefore I am for the unity of all moderate forces of any and every party that has

a progressive outlook".

New York, Nov. 8th. — Returns today, supplementing those of last night, showed that Republican Senate seats from Indiana, Maryland, New Jersey, New York, Michigan and West Virginia, apparently had been captured by the Democrats and that the Republicans had captured Senate seats held by Democrats from Nebraska and Ohio. In Delaware, Montana and Minnesota, the results were still too close to be counted in either column. These returns, so far, would reduce the Republican majority in the Senate from twenty-four to sixteen, with prospects of a further reduction.
