TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Berlin, Nov. 7th.—The Left Wing In-
dependent Socialists joined with the Ger-
man Communists this morning in com-
memorating the anniversary of the Rus-
sian revolution.

Tokio, Nov. 7th.—A firm attitude to-
wards the United States was recom-
mended by speakers at a public meeting
held on Friday evening for discussion of
the situation created by the action of the
Californian legislation affecting the Ja-
panese.

New York, Nov. 6th.—Cuban cane
sugar earned \$17.69 a share on common
stock in the year ending September 30th.
as against \$7.77 the preceeding year.

Belfast, Nov. 7th.—Wild scenes were
witnessed in Londonderry on Saturday
night as a sequel to a sudden attack on
policemen there. Five police were shot,
two of them so seriously that they are
not expected to recover. Two shops
were burned to the ground and seven
others were wrecked. All the property
belonged to Sinn Feiners. The attack
