The Last Day's Trial of Emanuel Faulkner, the Accused Murderer of Anselmo Anduze at Mary's Fancy Dec. 25; 1920.

The day for which was set the last trial of Emanuel Faulkner, the accused murderer of Anselmo Anduze at Mary's Fancy on Christmas Day 1920, dawned upon the little town of Christiansted in which anxious people dreamed the night before only of the verdict to be given on the evidences received the day subsequent. The Jurymen awoke to the responsibility which confronted them that day, and stretched themselves with a yawn, then a cheery, "Good-morning" to each other, the morning's toilette performed. They betook themselves on the eastern porch on the third floor of Government's Building into which they were confined for over forty hours, a precaution necessary to insure unbiased opinion and deliberate judgment on the case; there they listened to the sweet strain of music, which floated over to them, borne by the cool breeze of a balmy morning.

To find twelve other such men in whom the people had so much confidence for so intricate a case, would prove a task; the interest throughout the whole proceeding, the patience manifested by them was wonderfully encouraging, and the respect with which they were held by all, is due to the master ability of each man in his private life and influence in the community. Meanwhile the time wore on; and a crowd had gathered at every available entrance, and upon the opening of these portals, they rushed violently against each other, regardless of bodily injury even to self, in their eagerness to secure admission into the small, square courthouse.

At the hour appointed Judge McKean with stately stature, entered the room, and had just taken his seat, when the bell in the old steeple chimed the hour of nine. The prisoner then entered the room in the custody of Chief Espersen, of the Municipal Police Force; his face wore a sad expression, to which effect long hairs on head and body added to the samson-like appearance of the sturdy young man; his step was brisk, and his heavy boots echoed through the stillness of the moment, and penetrated every corner of the room.

The day's proceeding was immediately announced, and as all other witnesses had testified the days previous, Faulkner was summoned to witness stand by his counsel, who was none other than Judge Payne, appointed by the court to defend as much as he was able the unfortunate young man and well did he exert himself in the capacity, though all other evidence seemed against him; well did he upturn each stone in the path that might have led to the acquittal of his charge. His appeal as admitted by Government Attorney Keyser his direct opponent in the case, was a masterpiece. Eloquent words flowed from the heart of this man, and made its effect felt upon all within distinct the ring of his voice; it was no mean appeal backed by a fee; it was not a professional working for his wages; but it was with that deep seated love of man for his fellowman, with the fervour of a patriot that he pleaded for the life of that "poor boy", and it only that warmth of expression, the ethereal ardor of that appeal, that saved the rope from that "poor boy's" neck; and had it not been for a letter introduced at almost the last moment by the accused; purporting to have been written by Emanuel Martin his alleged emissary in the crime, and which was proved as false testimony, that appeal would have gone further in its influence, and the All Highest only knows what would have been the result. The people were met in sympathy for the deceased and a demand of justice for themselves; and Attorney Keyser was not delinquent in his duty to the people; no trail was missed by his careful eyes; no camouflage could conceal the minutest detail that led to the conviction of the
