ST. CROIX STATION.

New York, June 6th—Raw sugar was quieter today and in the absence of new business prices were unchanged at 4.77 for Cuban, duty paid. Trading in raw sugar was of an evening up character, but the undertone was steadier. Prices at best showed advances of 9 to 11 points on covering, but eased off partially in the late trading under realizing and were finally 4 to 8 points net higher. July closed 3.26, September 3.38, December 3.25, March 3.05. Refined sugar was unchanged at 6.30, to 6.40, for fine granulated, with only a slight inquiry reported. Refined futures were nominal.

Reuters, Melbourne June 6th—An Air Mail Service between Adelaide and Sydney, a distance of over 750 miles, was inaugurated this morning. The first aeroplane in the new service arrived at Sydney from Adelaide a day behind the schedule time, owing to misty weather.

London, June 5th—Mr. Harcourt Johnstone, a Liberal member of Parliament, son of Sir Alan Johnstone, has won the second prize in the great Calcutta Derby Sweep. He shared his ticket with a friend. Its amount is expected to be about 20,000 pounds.

Tokio, June 9th.—Captain Doisy, the French aviator, successfully completed his long flight from Paris to Tokio this morning when he arrived at Tokoro-sawa, about 30 miles northwest of here. He left Osaka at 8.30 a. m. completing the last leg of his flight in three hours and one minute.

London, June 7th.—The Prince of Wales is enroute to spend another holiday in France. He left London Friday

for the famous beach of Le Touquet, where he will spend the weekend.

Honolulu, June 7th.—The Special Squadron of the British Navy, headed by the battle-cruiser "Hood," arrived here yesterday for a visit of one week.

Winnipeg, Man., June 8th.—The North country of Alberta with its millions of acres of timber, is ablaze for one hundred miles North of McMurray, with fire covering a territory from fifty to seventy miles east and west of that place, according to word received here from Col. Cornwall, Forestry Superintendent who declares it the worst fire in the past 25 years. The blaze originated on the head waters of a creek where beaver hunters had established camps. Practically the entire beaver country has been destroyed. It will be necessary to shut down on beaver trapping for the next five years. The loss in timber is up in the millions of dollars already and the fire is still raging.

Belfast, June 8th.—Word was received here today that Viscount Perrie, Chairman of the Harland and Wolff Shipbuilding Company, has died at sea near the Panama Canal. Lord Perrie, accompanied by Lady Perrie sailed on March 20th for Southampton for a three months' visit to Brazil and Argentine, to make an inspection of harbour conditions and facilities for new steamers of the Harland and Wolff Company.

Ottawa, June 8th.—The debate on the Lausanne Treaty in the British House of Commons on Friday is to have its counterpart in the Canadian House on Monday. The estimates of the external affairs department are to come under fire and the Premier is expected to make a formal statement of the Government's position on the Lausanne Treaty and the reasons which led him not to ask the Canadian Parliament to approve that agreement.

London, June 9th.—Leaders in the anti-American movement, which has sprung up in Japan as a result of American exclusion of Japanese, are planning further demonstrations, according to a Tokio despatch to the Central News. The despatch reports that demonstrators planned to visit foreign churches last night to protest from the pulpits against exclusion.

Kingston, Jamaica June 10th.—Serious rioting occurred in Kingston yesterday arising out of the pay accepted by some labourers being engaged by the Kingston and St. Andrew Corporation for the re-

construction of the Kingston streets. Hundreds of others mostly of the hoodigan class shouting for higher pay took away the tools from those accepting the lower day rate and soon got out of control and rushed towards the reconstruction offices wrecking them severely wounding some of the staff. The police were called out and in the melee ensuing tow of the rioters were killed and forty wounded and seven policemen are in the hospital. Free use was made of stones, bricks, bottles, iron pipes, shovels and pickaxes and it is said revolvers. After firing over their heads and not despersing but answering with a redoubled fire of bricks etc the police in self defense charged with batons, bayonets and rifles and were it not for the meritoriously prompt action casualties would have been heavier. The rioters fled in all directions as soon as a real volley was fired into the crowd and screams of anguish rent the air. The City remains perfectly quiet and business was carried on as usual.

London, June 9th.—The anti-American demonstration at the Imperial Hotel in Tokio has focussed attention afresh on the immigration trouble and the comment of the morning newspapers is tinged with anxiety.

London, May 26th.—(Delayed in transmission) The bye election for the Kelvingrove Division of Glasgow resulted as follows. Elliott, Conservative, 15,488, Ferguson, Labour, 11,167, and Pratt, Liberal, 1,372.

London, June 10th.—The holiday crowds at the Wembley Exhibition yesterday (Whit Monday) exceeded all expectations, numbering no less than 321,322. The West India regiment band headed the Bristol pageant performers round the grounds and throughout the day the West Indies pavilion was so densely crowded that it was necessary to form the throng into queues outside the Jamaica coffee and planters punch room and the Trinidad chocolate lounge. During the afternoon hundreds of people picnicked in the West Indian Gardens. Over thirty five thousand persons visited the Bermuda pavilion during the day.
