TELEGRAMS

ST. CROIX STATION.

Paris, Aug 16th—A German aerial service has been organized, according to advices to the French Foreign Office, to supply the Russian Soviet Staffs with all military information concerning Polish strategic movements that German pilots can perceive in their flight from East Prussia over Polish territory. The Foreign Office said yesterday that the entire arrangement was outlined in a document which fell into the hands of the Polish authorities. The Russian forces are also being supplied with enormous amounts of munitions and food across the East Prussian frontier, according to reports to the Foreign Office from the French military mission in Warsaw.

London, Aug. 16th.—M. Kameneff, one of the Bolshevik Commissioners here, yesterday wrote Mr. Lloyd George, notifying him that "notwithstanding the hostile acts of the French Govt., which are calculated to prevent the holding of a peace conference, the Soviet Govt. does not consider it necessary to alter its conditions for armistice and peace preliminaries, already communicated to your Govt."

Warsaw, Aug. 16th.—An official communication issued by the war office today says: "In the northern section a severe struggle is developing near Plock our detachments have dispersed three Bolshevik regiments, taking 230 prisoners and machine guns. A lancer regiment in an attack, completely annihilated a Bolshevik detachment. The action is developing satisfactorily. We have retaken Nowoiasto and Smarrdezo. East of War-

saw the third and sixteenth armies having received orders to storm the capital, began attacks toward Radzymin, which was taken only to be re-captured by a counter attack. A desperate struggle continues in this sector."

London, Aug. 16th.—Workmen in upper Silesia regard the recognition of General Wrangel, the anti-Bolshevik leader in South Russia, as equivalent to a declaration of war. Russia, accordingly will refuse to recognize the French representatives on the Plebiscit Commission, contending they are not neutral says the Daily Mail's Attowitz correspondent. Mr. Lloyd George stated in the House of Commons today that the Govt. had made it clear to General Wrangel, the anti-Bolshevik leader in South Russia, that if he further attacked the Soviet forces, he must do so on his own responsibility.

Dublin, Aug. 16th.—The Lord Mayor of Cork, who was arrested last Thursday and other members of the corporation, will be tried on the charge of sediton, according to a statement made here yesterday. Belief is expressed by the military, that in Thursday's raid on the Cork mansion house, they secured the arrest of the leaders of the Republican brotherhood.

Antwerp, Aug. 16th.—King Albert, accompanied by the Queen and the Royal Family, opened the Olympiad on Saturday. The ceremony was elaborate and the parade of athletes, a magnificent one. A crowd of 10,000 spectators greeted Their Majesties. The establishment of a new world's record for the javelin featured the opening. Myrra added 5.14 metres to the record of 60.64 metres. In his heat of the one hundred metres penton, Canada ran second to Abrahams of England who won in 10 3-5 seconds. The 800 metres race was won by Rudd of South Africa. Hill (England) was second and Etsy (America) third. Thomas Town, the Brandon man, was beaten in the first heat of the 5,000 metres. Town held the fourth position for a mile but dropped out after two miles. Frank Loomis (Chicago) won the final in the 400 metre hurdles, the first three places all going to the United States competitors. Loomis time, 52 seconds is an olympic and world's record.

Berlin, Aug. 16th.—The Commander of the 12th. Russian Soviet Division which Friday night entered Soldau on the Warsaw-Danzig railway, approximately 15 miles north-west of Milawa solemnly declared to a deputation of the inhabitants that this territory never again would belong to Poland, according to despatches received here yesterday. The Polish Burgomaster of Soldau fled. The Russians appointed a Citizen Committee, from which Poles were excluded. The citizens are jubilant, the despatches say the German flag is again floating over the town.

London, Aug. 16th:—The House of Commons to-night without a division agreed to the motion of Mr. Bonar Law

adjourning the House until October 19th, but empowering the speaker to summon Parliament earlier, should public interests demand it. This and Mr. Bonar Law's undertaking that in the event of Russia's armistice terms to Poland being materially altered, the Govt. would take no action without consulting Parliament, meet the oppositions objections that the country should not be committed to an intervention against Russia without the consent of Parliament. Mr. Bonar Law confirmed that the armistice terms to Poland as announced by Russia had the approval of both Great Britain and Italy, and he said that if they were sincerely adhered to, Great Britain would not interfere between Poland and Russia. Paragraphs in the newspapers recently considered by some to be inspired, had led the public to expect a announcement of some new development of policy for Ireland from the Premier or Mr. Bonar Law on the lines of Dominion Home Rule, but this expectation met with disappointment. Mr. Lloyd George confined himself to repeating his previous offer that the Govt. would discuss a settlement with any representatives of Irish opinion, not excluding the Sinn Feiners provided they accepted three stipulations which he carefully defined. That Northern Ulster six counties must be treated separately. That there must be no secession directly or indirectly of any part of Ireland from the United Kingdom and that the Govt. could not agree to anything that would involve any retraction from the security of the British Isles, or of their safety in case of war. This guarded statement, although announcing no new policy, will probably be interpreted as an invitation to continue outside discussion of the Dominion settlement, which have made much unexpected progress recently and enlisted support in hitherto antagonistic quarters.

London, Aug. 16th.—The announcement that the Polish and Russian armistice and peace delegates had met at Minsk, was made by Earl Curzon in the House of Lords today. Negotiations were doubtless proceeding, he added.

Warsaw, Aug. 16th.—Uninterrupted fighting is going on in the valley of the Bug from its source to its confluence with the Narew River. The great battle which has just begun along the river has been marked by appreciable advantages for the Poles. They have inflicted heavy losses on the enemy and won back important positions. In Galicia the Poles without pressure from the Bolsheviks, have withdrawn to the line of the Bug. The forces defending Warsaw are now grouped as follows: The left wing resting on the forts of Modlin (Novogeorgievsk) holds the line of the lower Narew and Bug. The centre protected behind by the outer forts of Warsaw which occupies positions si-
