TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Paris, April 3rd. — In the international rugby games played at Colombes stadium here between England and France, England won by a score of 12 points to three.

Berlin, April 3rd. — The employees of the Krupp plant at Essen began today it is announced here, a twenty-four hour strike in protest against the French action of last Saturday in firing on a crowd of Krupp employees resulting in 11

deaths and a score seriously wounded. There are about 54,000 men employed at the plant.

Berlin, April 3rd. — General Degoutte's ultimatum, demanding the payment of the coal tax in the Ruhr, has been extended for a fortnight to April 15th.

London, April 3rd. — A despatch to the Times from Riga, dated Tuesday, says: "The Soviet Government denies that Vicar-General Butchkavitch has been shot. It says the execution has been suspended". The Times prints the foregoing beneath the announcement from Moscow that the prelate was executed on Saturday. Editorially the Times alludes to the despatch from its Riga correspondent and expresses the hope that the fate of Vicar-General Butchkavitch will not long remain a question of such grave doubt as that of Archbishop Benjamin of Petrograd, regarding whom, it says, no definite information has been received since he was condemned to death in 1922 for interfering with the seizure of Church treasures.

London, April 3rd — The fishermen's strike resulted in wild scenes in Aberdeen today, when a crowd of sympathizers damaged German and other foreign trawlers in the harbour. The trawlers

were unloading fish, but intense stoning from the crowd compelled them to put to sea. The boats had to run the gauntlet of crowds assembled on both sides of the harbour mouth. The bombardment of the vessels was so intense that cries of pain and alarm were heard from the decks.

London, April 3rd. — The question of prohibition came up today at the Annual Conference of the Independent Labour Party, which has been in session here three days, and it led to a lively debate. A solution was submitted by Liverpool delegates, urging public ownership and control of the liquor traffic, and Glasgow delegates moved an amendment, favouring total prohibition. A delegate from Birmingham protested that Scotland was trying to dominate the conference. The Glasgow men response was that it would be a good thing if Scotland could dominate Birmingham and bring the latter up to the labour standard. One of the Glasgow delegates, speaking in support of the amendment, said one of the most degrading sights Scotchmen had witnessed in London was queues of women with infants in their arms standing outside public houses waiting their turn to get inside. A Dundee delegate denied that drink led to crime and degradation. He pointed out, amid laughter, that one of the biggest bank robberies ever known in Glasgow was perpetrated by a temperance man and he instanced the case of a prominent financier and insurance magnate in London, who was recently sentenced to prison for fraud, who was President of a temperance society. The amendment in favour of prohibition was defeated by a vote of 263 against 52 for amendment. The resolution for public ownership was carried by a large majority. A resolution was carried expressing the opinion that Labour members of the House of Commons should not accept hospitality of political parties at functions of society. The conference which concluded today, referred to the Administrative Council a resolution, which has been submitted by the Bradford delegates, proposing the abolition of Cabinet Government and the substitution therefore of Government committees of the various parties represented in the House of Commons. Capt. Trevelyan, Labour member of the House of Commons for Newcastle-on-Tyne, opposed the resolution, which, he said, simply proposed to substitute Parliamentary anarchy for Government tyranny.

New York, April 3rd. — Lord Robert Cecil, in an interview with newspaper men today, denied that his trip to the United States was purposed to tell the United States what they should do about the League. "I am not an impertinent intervener in other people's affairs", he asserted. "I thought I had made it clear in my public statements that my object in coming here was to give information
