SUGAR NOTES.

The New York curb had a flood of can-

dy stock promotions in August the like of which has never been seen before. There is a general belief that with the going of the liquor business the candy consumption is on the increase. It is believed that the American pocket-book has been tapped by the dentists via the sweet-tooth route and now these new companies plan to do the same. The Sweet Company of America manufactures and sells "tootsie rolls," the Continental Candy people sell "lolly pops" and now comes a new company known as the United Retail Candy Company manufacturing, buying and selling nothing but which has the remarkable joy of a stock market valued at \$35,000,000. The men who are backing this company are in part in the corporation known as the United Cigar Stores. These stores have been handling an increasing amount of candy especially in prohibition States, and the new company will handle candies exclusively. These tobacco interests know nothing of the candy and sugar business, but they have exceptional organizing ability and plan to operate 100 stores in America. The prices of candies have been exceptionally high and it is believed the United States will cut into the prices. *The Louisiana Planter*, Oct. 4th.

Many German beet raisers have plowed down their beet field and have sown grass upon them because they find that labor conditions are such that in many sections no solution seems in sight this summer and they do that very reluctantly. The whole social fabric seems to be broken up in many sections and little hope of an immediate solution seems in store for the discouraged farmers. Still a large acreage has been reported and where farmers have a good seized family there may be a chance to work up many of the fields. —*Ibid.*

Lehi, Utah, reports a crop of 75 per cent above normal this year and the average yield is 10 tons per acre, which is in keeping with the tonnage of this section of the United States. —*Ibid.*

Way down in South Africa the sugar makers are rejoicing over the government increase of 3 shillings per hundred

pounds in the price of sugar. The Natal Sugar Association made a drive on the government for this notable increase and succeeded in overthrowing the trenches of ignorance. The increase was made June 7th. and will stand until April 30th, 1920. Under this increase sugar will sell at 26 shillings per hundred pounds which is 6.32 cents a pound and raws will sell at 25 shillings, or 6.08 cents a pound. Retailers are allowed 1/4 of a penny per pound at Durban and that will be 4 pence while in the interior it may be sold at 4 1/2 pence. The government yielded to this increase on condition that the association supply all of South Africa. Whatever profits should accrue from exports, these profits were to be divided pro rata among all producers so that sugar makers and planters should share in the margin. *Ibid.*

Reports from Pennsylvania say that potash has been discovered in the mountains of the State and if the find has the chemical analysis necessary to make potash an article of commerce in this country will suddenly be independent of all foreign potash mines. The state geologist reports vast quantities of potash and of enough nitrate to lower the competitive prices of potash from Chile. This is good news for cane planters and beet-sugar raisers. —*Ibid.*
