PROCEEDINGS OF THE COLONIAL COUNCIL FOR ST. CROIX.

(Concluded from yesterday's Avis.)

2nd Member for Christiansted Town (*Canegata*): Mr. Chairman. As far as I am aware none of the items referred to by the Honorable gentleman have not been placed on this budget by the Public Works Officer.

4th Member for Frederiksted Country District (*Andersen*) remarked: Mr. Chairman. Why should the Honorable 2nd Member for Christiansted Town worry? The cistern is protected. My amendment is merely to take care of the other items under new construction for the benefit of the island and its inhabitants.

2nd Member for Christiansted Country District (*Berg*): Mr. Chairman. Has the amount for the cistern not been voted for last year?

The *Chairman*: Yes, the money has been voted for.

Government Secretary [*Zane*] remarked: Mr. Chairman. In connection with the amendment just introduced to this resolution, may I state that Government cannot further it as being entirely too general in its terms and designed to make a blanket proposition of an inconcrete thing which nobody in the world could follow from an accountability or appropriation standpoint.

The amendment brought in by 4th Member for Frederiksted Country District [*Andersen*] was read by the Assistant Secretary and the Chairman put same to the vote with the result that 4 members voted for; 5 against.

The amendment brought in by 1st Member for Frederiksted Town (*Jackson*) was also put to the vote with the result that 4 members voted for; 5 against.

4th Member for Frederiksted Country District [*Andersen*] remarked: Mr. Chairman. I want my protest to go on record that the amendment introduced by the Honorable 2nd Member for Christiansted Town is entirely out of order.

2nd Member for Christiansted Town [*Canegata*]: Mr. Chairman. I object to the Honorable Member breaking through the rules. If he is allowed to do so I will ask to be allowed to reply.

4th Member for Frederiksted Country District [*Andersen*] remarked: Mr. Chairman. A new bill has been introduced under the guise of an amendment. I object, and want my objection to go on record. The amendment is in reality Government's amendment, but introduced by the Honorable 2nd Member for Christiansted Town.

2nd Member for Christiansted Town [*Canegata*] remarked: Mr. Chairman. After discussion on a matter is closed I do not consider it right to give carte blanche to the Honorable 4th Member for Frederiksted Country District to take the floor and break through the rules as he pleases.

The Resolution as amended by the proponent was put to the vote with the result that 11 members voted for; none against.

4th Member for Frederiksted Country District [*Andersen*] remarked: Mr. Chairman. I vote for the Resolution. I want to vote for it.

2nd Member for Christiansted Town [*Canegata*] remarked: Mr. Chairman. I wish to record my thanks to the Honorable 4th Member for Frederiksted Country District for voting for my amendment.

The Chairman called an extraordinary meeting of the Council for Monday 30th. inst., at one o'clock p. m.

There being no further business before the House the Chairman declared the meeting closed at 6.10 p. m.

The Post Office Department advises that postmasters will shortly receive from Major General Robert C. Davis, the

Adjutant General of the Army, a number of application blanks, instructions, and return addressed envelopes to be distributed in their several communities to veterans and their dependents desiring to make application for benefits under the World War Adjusted Compensation Act. One set, consisting of an application blank, instructions, and a return addressed envelope, will be given to any one asking for same.

This is not the only means of distributing such blanks, instructions and return addressed envelopes to those entitled to the bonus, but it is rather to supplement other agencies which will mainly assist in this work. The other agencies through which application blanks, etc., may be obtained are the American Legion, American Red Cross, Veterans of Foreign Wars, and the Society of Disabled Veterans. It is to accommodate those who may not have access to these agencies of distribution that the post office is asked to cooperate.

It will not be necessary for postmasters to give any instructions to applicants. The blanks, etc., sent them by the War Department will afford a complete explanation.
