U. S. PRESS NEWS.

NEW ORLEANS: Eleven members of the crew of the British steamer Elm Leaf were wounded early today when guards resorted to pistol fire to quell a mutiny aboard the vessel. Twenty-four Chinese participated in the riot, which was result of officers of ship announcing that no shore leave would be granted in accordance with federal regulations.

DUBLIN: Reports of shooting and reprisals over the week continue to be received here from various parts of the country. District Inspector of Police was shot and killed last night at Granard. At Tullemore a police sergeant was wounded by an unknown man and died. Two constables were shot dead at Kelloglin last night. Armed civilians captured and destroyed the Tittleton police barracks Sunday taking all the arms and munitions.

HAVANA, CUBA: Fourteen were killed in Cuban election. Gomez carried Havana province while Zayas had a lead of over three thousand in outside provinces.

SEBASTOPOL, CRIMEA: The Bolsheviks have broken General Wrangel's center and the wings of his army apparently have been crushed. The town of Melopol and other points have been abandoned and the "Reds" are nearing Perekovp. The red wave is flooding the Taurida region. Wrangel is making a
