### U. S. NAVY PRESS NEWS.

January 8, 1920.

WASHINGTON: Resolutions endorsing the treaty of Versailles and denouncing the attitude of the Senators who defeated it directly or by nullifying reservations were unanimously adopted today by the Democratic National Committee. The place for the nineteen-twenty convention will be chosen late today.

WASHINGTON: Thirty-four photostatic sheets containing the names of two thousand six hundred and twenty-four naval officers recommended for decorations were made public by Secretary Daniels last night. They show the name of every officer recommended, the action of the Knight Board and the final award approved by the Secretary. The list has been sent to Senator Page who has appointed a sub-committee to investigate the award controversy.

NEW YORK: Parlor Bolsheviks who are raising a fund to assist communists held on deportation proceedings will be invested in liberty bonds in order to get their friends out on bond. The authorities at Ellis Island have refused to accept cash. Two Germans arrested in recent raids were deported to Hamburg yesterday.

WASHINGTON: The Soviet bound transport "Buford" with its cargo of two hundred and forty-nine Radicals is about to enter the Kiev canal. It is believed that the "Buford" will go to Riga to discharge its radicals for transportation to Soviet Russia.

CHICAGO: Types of airplanes and flying equipment and biplanes solving the problem of aviation were exhibited today at the first western aeronautical show. Exhibits were made by the United States Navy, signal corps, aerial mail service and aeroplane manufacturers.

WASHINGTON: William Jennings Bryan is in Washington today. He is expected to tell the assembled party chieftains and the rank and file what he thinks should be the party's issue in the coming campaign.

WASHINGTON: American ships furnished by the Shipping Board will be used to repatriate troops of four countries that are now in Siberia. The first of the vessels the "President Grant" and the "America" will leave New York for Vladivostok. General Hines, Chief of
