TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Inverness, Sept. 9th.—The Prime Minister today sent a reply to a message from the Trades Union Congress at

Cardiff in which he declares that no body is more opposed than the Government to bloodshed and most of all to a fratricidal war between citizens of the same Empire, but, he added, I have the authority of the greatest democratic statesman in history for the belief that even bloodshed is better than the disruption of a living political organism.

Paris, Sept. 9th.—General Von Oven, former Governor at Metz and two other Generals, all commanders of German troops in the neighbourhood of Nomeny, France, in 1914, will be immediately asked to present themselves for trial before a war council at Nancy, on charges of committing atrocities, says the newspaper "Excelsior". If they do not obey the summons, the newspaper declares, judgment will be given against them by default.

Constantinople, Sept. 9th.—The Greek forces occupying a position on the right wing of the Sakaria river front are withdrawing from the battle area, in consequence of heavy losses and the difficulty of maintaining communication with their base of supplies, which is hundreds of miles away. The Greek casualties, including sick, are reported to be ten thousand. The troops are tired and are said to be unable to make fresh efforts in any attempt to drive the Turks back to Angora.

Constantinople, Sept. 9th.—Military experts here express the opinion that the Greek offensive towards Angora, the Turkish Nationalist capital, has resulted in complete failure, the reverse being due not only to transportation difficulties, but also to bad generalship and inefficient artillery. The Turkish forces put up a stubborn resistance, driving back the attacking Greek forces and inflicting heavy losses. The hospitals in Asiatic Turkey are filled with the wounded.

Washington, Sept. 9th.—The international mercantile marine, through its president, Mr. Franklin, as submitted to the United States Shipping Board a new agreement entered into with the British Govt., as a substitute for the agreement which bound the corporation to pursue no policy injurious to the interests of the British Mercantile marine or to British trade.

Washington, Sept., 9th.—President Harding today announced the full United States delegation to the disarmament conference. It consists of four members, Mr. Hughes, Secretary of State, and Senator Root, Lodge, and Underwood. These four will represent the United States at the table at which will be gathered four delegates from each of the other Nations to be represented. The conference proper, or what might be termed the supreme body, will consist of twenty members, each of the five major powers being represented by a "Big Four".
