Dublin yesterday. The University XI went to bat first and were disposed of for a score of 100, to which the West Indians replied with 160 for the loss of 9 wickets. Following are the scores. Washington, July 23rd.—Recognition of the Russian Soviet Government by the United States cannot come while its leaders continue to evince "a spirit of destruction at home and abroad", according to a declaration by Mr. Hughes made public yesterday.

Rome, July 23rd.—The discovery of two Italian doctors of scarlet fever germs is reported by the newspapers. The physicians, doctors Christiana and Caroni, claim many cases of the disease have been ward off by them through the injection of a serum.

London, July 22nd.—Eamon De Valera, in a statement to an American paper correspondent made through his publicity department, declares, "it is not the Republican Government's or army's intention to renew warfare in the Autumn after the elections. So far as we are concerned, the war is finished. We intend to devote ourselves to social reform

and education and to develop the economic and material strength in the nation".

Dublin, July 23rd.—Eamon De Valera, in a message to the American Association for the recognition of the Irish Republic, appealing for election funds, says the people of Ireland are still overwhelmingly Republican at heart and that the Anglo-Irish treaty was "forced" on them by threats of war from Great Britain. De Valera says that about \$100,000 will be needed. It is expected that the Dail will dissolve at the end of the week and that elections will be held the first week in September. Election campaigning has already begun. It is stated that De Valera's followers, although contesting a number of seats will generally adopt a policy of abstention, but, according to the statement issued by De Valera, he seems to envisage an active fight. He says that if the election are unfettered and the Republicans are again in the majority, the policy will be to govern the country on Sinn Féin lines, as in 1919, refusing to cooperate with Great Britain until Great Britain is ready to make an arrangement consistent with the independence and unity of Ireland as a single State.

New York, July 23rd.—The three foreign pole teams, two British and one Indian combination, which plan an invasion of the United States this season, will sail from England on August 11th. The visiting aggregations will comprise the British army four, which will inaugurate an annual competition with a United States army team in a series of matches at Westbury, New York, Sep-

tember 1st to 8th, Count De Madres Indian Tigers and a Hurlington club quartette, both of which will compete in invitation tournaments at Philadelphia and Westbury, in addition to the National open championship. All three teams, according to the association, will average at least thirty goals and be composed of some of the most noted international talent. Hurlingham four will include Captain Guest, Major Barret, Earl Hipping and Lord Rocksavage, who was a member of a British team that won the open title of the United States in 1919.

Pershawar, British India, July 23rd.—Fighting has broken out between the tribes men ruled by the Nawabs of Anb and Miangul, in the northwest frontier province. As a result of a dispute the Nawab of Anb occupied a part of his rivals territory by a surprise attack in which 30 men were killed. The Nawab of Miangul retaliated ruthlessly. Refugees are streaming into this city.

Lausanne, July 23rd.—Serbia will not sign the treaty between the European powers and Turkey, it is understood, as she finds certain of the economic and financial clauses unacceptable. The Serbians were prepared to sign reservations, but conference leaders declared that course impossible. A protocol of accession will be opened after the signature, leaving the possibility of further negotiations in Serbia's case.

Constantinople, July 23rd.—On the day of the signing of the peace treaty at Lausanne the Turkish light cruiser Hamidish will fire a salute to the Allied fleet in the Bosphorus. There will also be an exchange of flag salutes. This will be the first official friendly action between the Turks and the Allies for nine years.

London, July 23rd.—Discovery of an extensive anti-Soviet plot designed to promote a general insurrection against all Soviet republics and leaders of the third internationale, is reported by the Copenhagen correspondent of the Exchange Telegraph Company, who quotes the Stockholm Tidningen. The correspondent says that several prominent officials have been arrested.

Lausanne, July 23rd.—Poland and Turkey entered into new treaty relations here today. Their representatives signed three documents, a general treaty establishing friendly relations, a commercial treaty on the basis of the most favoured nations and an additional commercial convention. The last document includes features of the European treaty with Turkey, which will be signed by the Allies and Turkish representatives tomorrow.

Halifax, N. S. July 24th.—H. M. S. Calcutta, with Admiral Culme-Seymour on board, sailed from Pictou to St. John New Foundland; where H. M. S. Constance proceeded her. The Constance has since left for the west coast of Newfoundland.
