TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, July 5th.—The Dusseldorf correspondent of the Daily Mail cites as the first indication that the magnates of the Ruhr are inclined to accept the inevitable and come to terms, the signature of the agreement on Tuesday between the French authorities and Herr Von Buelow, acting head of the Krupp, to facilitate the removal of 70,000 tons of reparation coal and coke seized on Sunday at one of the Krupp subsidiary plants. The agreement involves the return to work of the 3,000 employees and gives the French engineers free access to the coal and coke stores while the French troops continue occupation of the premises although avoiding contact with the workers.

Rockford, Ill., July 5th.—Five persons were killed and several injured in a wreck on the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul railway this evening, according to meagre reports here. Several of the injured are being brought to Rockford hospitals, according to a call for ambulances sent here.

London, July 5th.—Trade Union leaders took strong measures to-day to break the dock strike, which was further extended and now involves 40,000 workers in London, Manchester, Liverpool and Avonmouth. If the strike continues to spread it is probable that other ports will be affected and fear exists among the heads of the Unions that unless better counsel prevails the strike before long may spread to other transport workers particularly the railwaymen who for some time past have been in an aggressive mood in fear that the companies may decrease further their wages.

Berlin, July 5th.—The German Government is expected to issue forthwith a statement deprecating sabotage and all forms of active resistance in the Franco-Belgian occupation areas. Chancellor Cuno has been having discussions with Monsignor Pacelli, the Papal Nuncio, who the Pope sent here from Munich to make intercessions on the subject of the Ruhr campaign. The Chancellor is understood to be most desirous that German resistance in the occupied territories shall be strictly passive, and in Reichstag circles it is fully expected that the Government will make an announcement within the next twenty-four hours voicing its opposition to active resistance in any form against the French and Belgians in the occupied territory, emphasizing that deeds of this nature are likely to jeopardize Germany's interest abroad. The Federal and Prussian Cabinets held a joint session this afternoon for considering the Ruhr situation and the passive resistance campaign.

Wimbledon, July 5th.—Miss Suzanne Lenglen has at last lost one of her many championships in tennis. She was forced this afternoon to give up her claim on the title to the mixed doubles champion-

ships of the world, and what is worse, she lost the honor in two straight sets. She and her partner, Jean Washer, the Belgium champion, were defeated 7-5, 6-3, in the semi-finals by the old tennis team Randolph Lycett and Miss Elizabeth Ryan, veterans of many a four racquet contest. Tomorrow afternoon Miss Lenglen will meet Miss Kathleen McKane first ranking English woman player, in the finals for the women's singles championship.

London, July 7th.—The Nottinghamshire cricket XI concluded their second innings against the touring West Indians at Nottinghamshire yesterday, scoring 345 as follows. Gunn 52, Walker 58, Hardstaff 33, Turner 0, Carr 18, Payton 54, Kirk 86, Flint not out 10, Barrett absent hurt Oates 1, Richmond 6, extras 27, total 345. Bowling for the West Indians Small took two wickets for 117 runs and Browne seven for 97. The West Indians then went in to bat in their second innings and at the close of play had compiled 219 for the loss of no wicket, as follows: Challenger not out 102, Taitlen not out 103, extras 8, total 219. The match was drawn. Today the West Indians will meet Leicestershire at Leicester.

Toronto, Ont., July 5th.—At a meeting of the executive of the Presbyterian Church Association here yesterday, a statement, drawn up by the legal counsel, was adopted setting forth that the association would oppose by every means in its power the passage of the church union bills through the Dominion Parliament and the provincial legislatures, the statement registered its objection to a circular sent out by the General Board of the Presbyterian Church asking for donations to meet the expenses of the union committees.

London, July 5th.—"Ireland today is as tranquil as Great Britain", said Mr. Timothy Healy, Governor General of the Irish Free State, in an interview with the Daily Express, prior to his return to Ireland last evening after conversations with the Imperial authorities here regarding Irish affairs. "The Free State is now established definitely despite the internal assaults that have been made upon it", the Governor-General said. He added that now peace had been established the Government was intently preoccupied with how to terminate a situation in which, to its sorrow, it found itself still holding 10,000 Irishmen. The Government's purpose, Mr. Healy said, was to release these prisoners as rapidly as possible without exposing the public to a recrudescence, of disorder, and they are now being freed at the rate of about 200 weekly.

Paris, July 6th.—Vice Admiral Ferdinand Jean Jacques de Byn, long chief of the French General Staff, died at his home here today after a lengthy illness. The Vice Admiral was head of the French Naval Advisory Board at the Washington Conference.
