### TELEGRAMS.

#### ST. CROIX STATION.

Paris, Nov. 15th.—Marshal Foch, was present at the meeting of the Ambassadors Council today, made a statement regarding military activities in Germany. He gave details of Germany's armament preparations, declaring the Reichswehr had been increased far in excess of the effectiveness permitted and that the manufacture of war materials had been resumed in unoccupied Germany. Hugo Stinnes had even transferred a number of workmen, who specialized in this branch of industry, from the Ruhr to the interior and further quantities of material had been ordered abroad, notably in Russia. Without being alarmed at the present time, said Marshal Foch, these proceedings nevertheless were a menace which might become grave in the future.

Athens, Nov. 15th.—A court at Eleusis has sentenced to death Generals Leonard Opoulos and Gargalides and Majors Avambos and Nicolareas, leaders of the recent revolutionary movement. Many other officers of high rank, in-

volved in the revolution, were sentenced to imprisonment for life or for long terms.

Paris, Nov. 15th.—"Expel the German Crown Prince with or without the help of England", was the call on the French Government voiced by the press today. Following a reported sharp disagreement between England and France, that came to light in the Ambassadors conference yesterday, and the British Prime Minister's warning of a refusal to collaborate with France, M. Poincare was urged to discipline Germany by himself.

Chicago, Nov. 15th.—Senator Hiram W. Johnson, of California, tonight announced his candidacy for the Republican nomination for President, declaring that "the ensuing contest will determine whether the Republican party shall be the permanent instrument of reaction, or whether it shall respond to present day conditions and aspirations."

Chicago, Nov. 15th.—David L. Rockwell, of Ravenna, Ohio, pre-convention leader of the James M. Cox campaign in 1920 and now managing a campaign to obtain for Wm. C. McAdoo, the Democratic presidential nomination, said in a statement today, that supporters of the former Secretary of the Treasury intend to nominate and elect him to the Presidency.
