OFFICIAL NEWS.

April 19, 1920.

Judge Noli has resigned from the bench in order to take up work corresponding to the duties of an Attorney-General for the Virgin Islands.

His resignation has been accepted by Governor Oman to take effect May 1st, 1920. He will be temporarily appointed as Government Attorney for the two Municipalities and in addition to such duties will devote his attention to the establishment of an office of Attorney-General.

The Government deems it necessary in view of the many matters which now confront it.

Judge Noli will be succeeded on the bench by Judge Curry.

The Secretary of the Navy has approved the abandonment of the Battery Station at East Point, St. Thomas, and the transfer of the Marine Corps buildings on that site to the Public Health Service.

NOTES ON BABY SHOW, APRIL 17TH 1920, HELD AT THE STEEPLE, MUNICIPAL HOSPITAL, CHRISTIANSTED.

One hundred and seven babies present, all of whom were weighed and 34 selected on account of weight, with reference to age, being up to the standard. These passed through a physical examination by the committee of Physicians consisting of Drs. Bailey, Jenkins Royster, and Canegata, Major Small and Mr. R. Skeoch.

1st Prize of \$5.00 awarded to Norman Jackson, 14 months, weight 24 lbs. 12 ounces. 2nd Prize \$3.00 to Einar Milligan, 6 months, weight 19 lbs. 3rd Prize \$1.00 to Mellville Sobotker, 3 months, weight 15 lbs. 11 ounces.

Lecture by Dr. W. O. Bailey on the care of babies. Also address by Mrs. McIlvaine, both received with applause by audience. The Native Brass Band, under the direction of Mr. Jackson was in attendance and added to the pleasure of the occasion by well rendered selections.

A remarkably fine gathering of babies and infants were present, showing that the infant welfare system is resulting in greatly improved condition.
