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TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Berlin, June 4th.—The Marx Stressemann Cabinet, which resigned on May 20th, but continued to carry on current affairs, is back in office. President Ebert last night reappointed Wilhelm Marx as Chancellor and confirmed the members of his Ministry in their posts. In the period intervening since the resignations of the cabinet it had been found impossible to bring about an alignment of parties so that a new ministry could come into power and the final outcome is a reunion of the German Peoples Party with the Clericals and Democrats, enabling the Marx-Stressemann combination to take office.

Rome, June 4th.—The Vatican has learned with regret of M. Herriot's intention if he becomes head of the French Ministry, to suppress the French Embassy to the Holy See. This is an unlooked for move so far as the Vatican is concerned and it is contended by Vatican officials that the Embassy is more to the advantage of France than the Holy See, as in maintaining good relations with the Papacy, France employs all the Catholic missions in the Near East and Far East for furthering French interests. It is recalled that the Vatican obtained from appointing a papal nuncio at Peking on the recommendation of France which desired that all Catholic interests in China should be looked after by the French Minister there.

THE COMMITTEE.

Shenandoah was placed in its hanger shortly after 9 this morning. It was the fourth attempt to land the huge aircraft, three others failing because the dirigible had become light through using so much fuel in its flight over New York and Pennsylvania on Tuesday.

London, June 4th.—The statement made by the Canadian Minister of Immigration in the House of Commons a few days ago that the Ottawa Government is considering the imposition of further restrictions on Japanese immigration into Canada, is causing some anxiety in Britain, lest such a move should lead to further complications, such as one endangering the relations between the United States and Japan. The Times, in an editorial this morning, maintains that the problem of Japanese immigration is not more serious to the United States than it is to the British Empire. In further comment, the Times regrets the decision of the Government not to proceed with the construction of the great naval base at Singapore, in view of the possibility of further complications developing in the Pacific.

New York, June 4th.—A further decline of 3/16 in the raw sugar market today established the lowest level in the past two years. Offerings were liberal and at the close Cuba was at 4.90, duty paid. Fine granulated is still quoted from 6.70, to 6.80 with nearly all at the inside level. Refined futures were nominal.

London, June 4th.—The Prime Minister, in a statement today in the House of Commons on the Irish negotiations, said the Government had secured a chairman for the boundary committee and declared that his name would be announced tomorrow. The Government had decided, he said, to set up a judicial committee to solve the constitutional legal issues of such a boundary dispute. The committee would include Chief Justice Sir Adrian Knox of Australia and would sit during July. Meantime the Government has not abandoned the hope that the two Irish Governments may reach a settlement before the committee is constituted. Such hope has been encouraged by conciliatory utterances by Sir James Craig, Premier of Ulster and President Cosgrave, President of the Irish Free State. It is reported in the lobby of the House of Commons this afternoon that the chairman of the Irish Boundary Committee would be Sir James Rose Innes Chief Justice of the Union of South Africa.
