RESOLUTION OF THE SUPREME COUNCIL OF THE ST. CROIX LABOR UNION.

Be it resolved and it is hereby resolved that we the Supreme Council of the St. Croix Labor Union in session assembled on the 14th day of June 1921 duly representing our constituents, having disapproved of the action of the President, in many of his movements, and especially in that of moving the Sheriff upon the Acting Director of the Educational Department grants and it is hereby granted unto the Rev. R. G. Barrow, the Acting Director of the Educational Department the free control of the property No. 2 Company Street in the Town of Christiansted, of which we are the real owners, with the exception of the stables, room for a car in the Garage; and the basement now occupied by the Herald Plant.

Also the undisturbed use of that portion of our house at Estate Grove Place which is presently used by the A. M. E. Church and by the St. Croix Benevolent Society.

Also the undisturbed use of the meeting hall on our property No. 32 and 33 King St. in the Town of Frederiksted, for Society Meetings.

We do also grant and it is hereby granted unto the aforementioned Rev. R. G. Barrow undisturbed access to all our estates and town properties for the purpose of carrying on instructive lectures as stipulated in the duties of the Director of the Educational Department of the Labor Union.

This resolution cannot be amended nor annulled before the return of the Founder of the Institution, Mr. D. Hamilton Jackson.

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Boston, June 13th.—The Cuba cane sugar corporation up to June 7th totalled 3,951,047 bags consisting of 2,367,487 bags from the Westernmills and 1,583,560 bags from the Eastern mills. Cuba sugar corporation mills have now completed their crop and ceased grinding and the probability is that the final figures will show an output of approximately 4,000,000 bags. Of this total approximately 60% still remains to marketed. On the sugars already disposed of the company realized some substantial pro-

fits, but the element of uncertainty lies in the fact that so large a portion of the crop must still be marketed. Including bonds of preferred and common stocks Cuba cane sugar is today selling in the market at the equivalent of about \$10 per bag of output based on a crop of 4,000,000 bags prior to the war \$15 a bag was regarded as a fair capitalization from sugar property.

New York, June 13th.—The raw sugar market was weak today and prices declined to the basis of 4.00 for centrifugals, the lowest ever recorded in over five years under continued pressure of Porto Ricos. There were sales of 24,500 bags of Porto Ricos afloat and for prompt shipment. Raw sugar futures were easier owing to the decline in the spot market and prices at midday were one to six points net lower. There were no changes in refined prices, which are listed at 6.00 for fine granulated. The undertone was unsettled and business light. Refined futures were nominal, with no transactions up to midday.

London, June 14th.—The Govt. intends to replace the British administration in Mesopotamia with an Arab assembly and an Arab ruler during the coming Summer, Mr. Winston Churchill announced in the House of Commons this afternoon. The ruler will be elected by the people. Mr. Churchill made the announcement in introducing in the House a supplementary estimate of 27,000,000 pounds for Government expenditures in the middle east. Emir Feisal, son of the King of Hedjaz has inquired if his candidacy would be acceptable, the Secretary said, and Great Britain had replied that no obstacle would be placed in his way and that if he were elected he would have Great Britain's support. Consequently Emir Feisal had already left Mecca for Mesopotamia, Mr. Churchill argued that the policy of working with the Sherifian family of the Hedjaz was advantageous and would not be detrimental to France. It would be fatal to the interests of both if France and England failed to cooperate, he declared. If we desire to maintain our position and discharge our responsibility in the middle east, Great Britain and France must pursue a policy of appeasement and friendship towards the Arabs and Turks and thereby secure a peaceful and lasting settlement with Turkey. Press reports last month forecast action much of the sort accounted today by the Colonial Secretary. It was unofficially declared that the Govt. placed the formation of a series of Arab states of which Mesopotamia was to be the chief and it was reported that the first King under the plan would be Prince Feisal, while his brother Abdullah would be ruler of the Transjordanian country. Mr. Churchill returned several weeks ago from a visit to Egypt and Palestine.
