since Sunday at Luceren. A statement that they had resolved to defer the resumption of diplomatic relation with the Moscow Government until it withdrew what was described as "this sinister proposal". It was said that negotiation of any kind with a Govt. "which so lightly treats its word", become "difficult if not impossible". It is understood here that a virtual ultimatum has been sent to Moscow by the two Premiers, whose decision relative to the recognition of the Bolshevik Govt. is viewed as approval of the stand made against that step by Premier Millerand. Lisburn, Ireland, Aug. 24th.—Loyalists last evening burned the private homes of Sinn Feiners and the furniture was carried into the street and ignited in revenge for the murder of police inspector Swansey here Sunday. The burning of Nationalists property here continued until after midnight. Among the buildings destroyed was the Catholic Parochial Hall. Virtually all the Nationalists have left town in the face of the Loyalist reprisal. Last night every house still occupied with the exception of that in which lay the body of Inspector Swansey flew the Union Jack, word having gone out that failure to exhibit the flag would be taken as evidence of disloyalty.

London, Aug. 24th.—In championship cricket today, Lancashire beats Worcestershire by an innings and 99 runs. The losers only scored 68 runs in their second innings. J. Tyldesley seven wickets for 34 runs, Gloucestershire beats Leicestershire by an innings and 53 runs. Parker took 14 Leicestershire wickets for 57 runs.
