TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Athens, Nov. 14th.—General elections were held throughout Greece today and on the outcome, is expected to hinge the question of whether former King Constantine shall come back to the throne again or remain in exile in Switzerland. M. Demetrios Gounaris, former premier and leader of the opposition, who was the opponent of Premier Venizelos in the balloting, was the candidate of the element desiring the return of ex-King Constantine. M. Venizelos on the other hand, is unalterably opposed to the return of the fallen monarch. In case Premier Venizelos is successful, he will be given a free hand in the selection of a new head of the state. The result of the election will not be known until Monday night, as there is an army vote in Smyrna and other distant points to be taken into consideration. It is expected that the soldiers will support M. Venizelos.

Athens, Nov. 14th.—Premier Venizelos announces that his party has obtained a majority in the elections throughout Greece.

Constantinople, Nov. 14th.—The army of General Wrangel has been wiped out and a number of his Generals have committed suicide. A mob in Sebastopol has pillaged the American Red Cross stores. The United States torpedo boat destroyers at Sebastopol are evacuating with officers and their families. The United States destroyer Humphrey, has gone to Toyalta to take off the Red Cross supplies.

Sebastopol, Nov. 14 h.—Mutinies in General Wrangel's army brought about his sudden defeat, it learned today. The French warship Waldeck-Roussau is

in port ready to embark General Wrangel who is here.

London, Nov. 14th.—Reuter's Paris correspondent today says, it is reported that the Bolsheviki captured Sebastopol Saturday night. Sebastopol advices under date of Sunday night make no mention of the capture of the city by the Bolsheviki.

Paris, Nov. 14th.—The Bleriot Airplane works have been closed down indefinitely, throwing 2,000 persons out of work.

Montreal, Nov. 14th.—The sugar war is on again in full force and a large wholesale firm will tomorrow sell Royal Acadia pure cane granulated sugar at 12c. following the reduction by the Dominion Sugar Coy. on Friday at 11.30 cents net to wholesales. The big refineries, the St. Lawrence, Acadia and Atlantic Sugar Refineries are quoting 13 cents less 5% since Saturday. Retailers are selling from 14 to 16 cents a pound, but may again cut their prices on Monday.

Montreal, Nov. 15th.—After closing at 20 Saturday Atlantic sugar opened this morning at 19 and then immediately dropped to 16½.

Rome, Nov. 15th.—The Pope has appointed the Right Rev. Patrick Rechardeffron, Bishop of Ninona, Minn. assistant to the pontifical throne. This is announced in recognition of the splendid work he had accomplished in his diocese.

Trieste, November 14th.—D'Annunzio's warships, have left Fiume for an unknown destination, most probably Dalmatia. The insurgent leader is in the open revolt against the Italio-Jugo-Slav agreement. He has seized the islands of Veglia and Arbe, which lie a short distance from Fiume.

New York, Nov 12th.—The "Evening World" announces that the Wall Street explosion has been solved by an independent investigation carried on by it. The "Evening World" states that the bomb which on September 16th, spread death and destruction in the Wall Street district was not fired by anarchists but by labour men in revenge upon Mr. R. Brindell, director of the Labour Trades Council.

Washington, Nov. 13th.—President Wilson issued his Thanksgiving proclamation last night saying that "in plenty, security and peace our virtuous and self-reliant people face the future", and setting aside Thursday November 25th. for the usual observance.
