TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

New York, May 23rd.—Mr. J. P. Morgan today announces that his banking house was prepared to organize a syndicate to underwrite \$25,000,000 of the \$130,000,000 Austrian reconstruction loan.

London, May 24th.—Mr. Mc Kenzie King, Premier of Canada, has the following Empire Day message in the Times today: "On the occasion of Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee, Sir Wilfred Laurier, with characteristic prophetic insight and vision spoke of the British as a galaxy of nations. The choice of words was a happy one. No longer are they capable of misinterpretation and misunderstanding. The stern logic of events has crystallized them into a formula. With each recurring anniversary of the birthday of the world's most illustrious sovereign, the outlying dominions welcome the opportunity of celebrating with the British Isles all that they owe to common origin, common tradition and common ideals. Among the nations of the world there is nothing comparable to this expression of union of purpose and co-operative effort on the part of each for the good of the whole."

St. Lucia, May 25th.—There having been no fresh case of alastrim since the 11th inst., clean bills of health are being issued from today.

London, May 24th.—Following is the result of the Winchester Cup run at Manchester yesterday: Bhuidhaonach 1st, Sularian 2nd, Beau Regard 3rd.

Washington, May 24th.—The British Ambassador, Sir Auckland Geddes, has been confined to a dark room by order of his physician because of a serious affliction of the eyes, the result of a gas at-

tack during the world war. Heretofore, however, he had recovered speedily from these attacks.

London, May 24th.—Mr. G. R. Hall Caine, independent member of Parliament for East Dorset, announced in a speech at Poole tonight that he is sailing next Wednesday for Canada to negotiate with the Dominion Government for the construction of two hundred miles of railway to open up new country for settlers. He holds out hope of valuable orders for the British steel industries which, if received, will be a big factor in relieving unemployment in Great Britain.

Lausanne, May 24th.—The heads of the Allied Delegates, after conferring this evening, decided not to convoke the financial commission until further notice, for consideration of the Greco-Turkish differences. The Allies will wait until the Turkish delegation has received a reply from Angora with regard to the compromise proposition in connection with Karagatch, but in order to comply with the desire expressed by the Greek delegation, the heads of the French, Italian and British Delegations have invited Ismet Pasha, head of the Turkish delegation, and M. Alexandris, the Greek Foreign Minister, to confer with them on Saturday.

Gelsenkirchen, May 24th.—Eight persons are dead seven men and one child, and between seventy and eighty are suffering from wounds, due to bitter fighting which broke out last night in the town between Communists and the defence force. The trouble had its origin
