TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Washington, Oct. 7th. The population of the United States has increased by 13,710,842 or fourteen per cent above the former figure. This does not include 12,250,000 inhabitants of the possessions of the United States, such as Alaska, etc.

Warsaw, Oct. 7th.—Advices have been received in this city stating that the armistice between the Russians and Poles will shortly be signed at Riga. It is reported that upon the arrival of Polish and Soviet delegates at Riga on Friday last they were received by the populace with visible signs of enthusiasm. The press of this city comment with satisfaction on the news of the armistice and predict that Poland, which has been greatly obstructed since its independence, will soon enjoy national tranquility. All fighting between the Bolsheviki and Polish forces have virtually ceased, according to advices received from the front.

London, Oct. 7th.—Mac Sweeney has entered on his fifty-sixth day of abstinence from food. He passed the night very well, but did not appear to get much rest and his state of weakness has increased, according to advices published by the Bulletin of the Irish League. Otherwise his state of health has not changed.

Rio de Janeiro, October 7th.—After a short sitting the Brazilian Senate approved of a motion conferring on King Albert of Belgium the title of citizen of Brazil, and authorizing the erection of a monument commemorating his visit to

Brazil. Both measures will be approved also by the Chamber of Delegates.

Nashville, Tenn., Oct. 7th.—Governor Cox, speaking here last night, accepted the League of Nations issue stated by Senator Harding.

Dayton, Ohio, Oct. 6th.—The Senate Committee investigating campaign funds resumed hearings here today. They plan to investigate the contributions to the campaign fund of Governor Cox in his race for the Governorship in 1918.

Washington, Oct. 6th.—Secretary of State Colby says that the mission of Rear Admiral Knapp to Haiti, for the adjustment of relations incident to the American occupation, was very successful. He says that the Haitian authorities received the Admiral very cordially and that all friction was soon ended.

New Orleans, Oct. 7th.—Doctor Juho Bianchi, the newly appointed Guatemalan Minister to the United States, has arrived here enroute to Washington. He reports the conditions in Guatemala as greatly improved, while business development surpasses expectations.

Washington, Oct. 7th.—The Shipping Board today made the third attempt to dispose of its wooden fleet, of more than 1,000,000 tons. Bids were opened for the purchase of 285 vessels.

Mobile, Ala., Oct. 7th.—The Shipping Board is about to sell the Government cement shipbuilding plant here at public auction. It is the largest plant of the kind in the world and was constructed during the war.

London, Oct. 6th.—Madrid reports a general strike throughout Portugal. It is apparently of a revolutionary character. All railroad employees have quit work and mail and other communications are at a stand-still.

Helsingfors, Oct. 6th.—The Russians and Fins at the Dorpat conference have agreed upon terms of peace. The signing of the treaty awaits the printing of the text.

London, Oct. 5th.—Sugar in stock on the 2nd inst. was 117,000 tons. Last year 130,000 tons.
