TELEGRAMS

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, Nov. 11th. Great Britain today impressively honoured her war hero's by according a field Marshall's funeral to an unknown British warrior who was buried in Westminster Abbey, and unveiling a permanent cenotaph in White Hall to the "Glorious Dead". Aside from members of the Royal Family, who included three Queens, Queen Mary, Queen Mother Alexandra and Queen Maud of Norway, the Members of the British Cabinet and a few officials, including Sir George Foster, Mr. C. W. Doherty and N. W. Rowell, the only witnesses to either ceremony were persons who lost relatives in the great war. As Big Ben, the great clock in the tower of the Parliament buildings began to strike the hour of 11 King George, facing the 16th century coffin of the unknown soldier, which was resting on a gun carriage, drew a cord which released the Union Jack, draped above the cenotaph and after the last stroke of the hour, thousands of people, who crowded White Hall as far as one could see in either direction, remained absolutely silent for two minutes. This silence was broken by a choir softly beginning the Hymn "Oh God our help in ages past", which was followed by the Lord's Prayer recited by the Archbishop of Canterbury. Buglers sounded "The Last Post" and with its escort of troops and a band the gun carriage then moved toward the Abbey with King George, as chief mourner, walking behind it. Sir George Foster deposited a wreath of maple leaves at the foot of the monument on behalf of the Dominion of Canada. Of all the witnesses that packed White Hall or crowded the Abbey a little band of approximately 100 women in the Abbey received the most reverend attention. They had been selected for the seats of honour because each had lost her husband and all her sons. The next to be considered were those mothers who lost their only sons or all their sons and then came women who lost their husbands only. The pall bearers were field marshals and admirals of the fleet including Viscount Douglas Haig, Earl Beatty, Admiral of the Grand Fleet and Major General Sir Hugh Trenchard, Commander of the British Air Forces. Battalions of Guards with their bands and a few others made up the balance of the escort. The grave was filled with soil brought from the grave from which the body was exhumed in France and was covered by what is known as the "Padres Flag", one of the most famous flags figuring in
