To The Patrons Of The Christian- sted Post Office, And The Gen- eral Public:

It is with gratification the announce-
ment is made that arrangements have been
concluded between the Post Office De-
partment and the Municipal Government
for a lease of the quarters now used for
this post office, under the terms of which
new and adequate lock box equipment
will be furnished, and provisions made
to admit of the lobby of the office being
left open before and after business hours,
and on Sundays and holidays, for the
accommodation of lock box patrons;
this to go into effect July 1st. It is be-
lieved that the number of lock-boxes to
be installed will meet the demand for
this kind of service, and it is hoped that
patrons will consider the benefit to be
derived therefrom and take advantage
of it. In this connection it should be re-
marked that after the installation of the
new boxes there will be no general de-
livery of mail on Sundays; delivery will,
however, be made through lock-boxes.
Three sizes of boxes will be available:
small, 3-3/16 x 4 1/2 @ 35 cents; medium,
5 x 5 1/2 @ 45 cents, and large, 10 1/2 x 5-13/16
@ 60 cents per quarter. These boxes will
be provided with key, and automatic key-
less locks the choice of which is optional to
patrons, and a deposit of 20 cents will be
required for each key issued to a renter
of a lock-box. Boxes will not be rented
to minors, nor contrary to the provisions
of the Postal Laws. Applications for
lock-boxes will be received at the money
order window of the post office from this
date. Upon installation of the equip-
ment bills will be rendered to such par-
ties as have registered their names, and
payment collected for at least one quar-
ter in advance. Boxes with the same
numbers will be assigned to those hold-
ers now renting boxes, but in event
smaller or larger boxes are desired, or
boxes with numbers different to those
now held, application for such changes
should be made at an early date.
