TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Lausanne, April 24th.—The resumed Near East Conference got under way today, with the Turks apparently in no more conciliatory frame of mind than during the previous conference, which collapsed over the economic and financial problems of the proposed peace treaty. The Angora delegates, the Allied spokesmen said tonight, gave no impression during the days proceeding of an intention to make concessions on any of the disputed points. The Turkish financial expert told the financial committee of the conference at its first meeting that the Turks wanted the whole world to understand that Turkey was ready and determined to pay her just share of the Ottoman debt, but wanted a definite understanding that the provinces detached from her territory, as a result of the great war, should also bear their just share of the total debt burden. He contended further that the secession states, including Syria, Palestine, Mesopotamia and the others, should stand a propor-

tionate cost of the withdrawal from circulation of the Turkish paper money. The Allies flatly declined to accept the Turkish contention that the paper money constitutes a debt to be borne by the detached provinces, but agreed that division of the Ottoman debt shall be obligatory and the matter will be submitted to experts, who will work out the details. Numerous other financial questions of an extremely technical nature were attacked but the majority were referred to the experts.

London, April 24th.—Mr. J. H. Thomas, M. P., General Secretary of the National Union of Railwaymen, as well as other leaders among the railwaymen in this country, depreciates the statement of Mr. Newbold, the communist member of the House of Commons for Motherwell, that this coming summer England will be faced with a railway strike. Many branches of the National Union of Railwaymen have passed resolutions expressing a determination to revise the proposed reduction in the present standard wage, but the policy of the railwaymen's leaders has been to discourage the strike as a weapon against the employers and they remain unshaken in this attitude.

Berlin, April 24th.—As a result of the depreciation of the mark, the 1923 budget, for the carrying out of the peace treaty, must be entirely redrafted and the amounts to be paid in foreign currency calculated on the basis of one dollar to 20,000 marks, it was announced today.

Washington, April 24th.—A clash between President Harding, backed by Messrs. Hughes and Hoover, and the Senate Republican leaders over entrance into the world court, may give an entirely new turn to the approaching presidential campaign. Senator Johnson, of California, now in Europe, will return in June. His friends predict that if republican opposition to the Harding world court plan continues, Senator Johnson, will almost certainly take the stump and become a candidate against President Harding.

Tralee, County Kerry, Ireland, April 25th.—Richard Hatheway, James McEnery and John Greaney were executed here today by the Free State authorities. Hatheway, who was a deserter from a British regiment, was captured in the recent siege of a cave in which a band of Irregulars was holding out on the Kerry cliffs.

New York, April 24th.—Coney Island and Far Rockaway, two of New York's best known seashore resorts, were visited this afternoon by fires that caused damage estimated at five hundred thousand dollars.

London, April 25th.—The prospect of Germany making a definite reparation offer, especially with reference to a settlement of the Ruhr situation, is widely discussed in the Press here. The view generally taken by German newspapers points to the likelihood that an important pronouncement regarding recent ut-
