TELEGRAMS:

ST. CROIX STATION.

Melbourne, Australia, Sept. 29th.—

(Reuter's). The Federal House of Representatives has passed the so-called Nauru arrangement, providing that the control of the former German islands in the Pacific, south of the Equator, shall pass to Australia and New Zealand, those north of the Equator to Japan.

London, Sept. 29th.—Sir Edward Cooper has been elected Lord Mayor of London.

Melbourne, Sept. 30th.—It is believed the Premier, Mr. Hughes, has decided on December 6th as the date for the general election and for the holding of the constitutional alteration referendum giving the commonwealth Govt. increased powers and allowing it to deal with the profiteering investigation.

London, Sept. 30th.—It was announced by the Govt. tonight that no unemployment allowance would be paid to workers thrown out of employment through the railway strike.

Leith, Sept. 30th.—The Caledonian railway has posted notices offering men returning to work, twenty-five per cent above the present wage, and also precedence for future promotion. Protection is assured.

Vienna, Sept. 30th.—Troops from the British fleet in the Black Sea have been landed in Odessa, and have occupied the city, according to advices received in Budapest.

Honolulu, September 30th.—Two ranch homes and much valuable forest have been destroyed by the lava flow from the latest eruption of the volcano of Maunaloa on the island of Hawaii. The flow is apparently a mile wide and is moving rapidly. It will probably reach the ocean thirty miles from the volcano today.

Berlin, Sept. 30th.—The great wooden von Hindenburg monument, which during the war was studded by the populace with nails representing so much money will be demolished this week, according to the "Vossische Zeitung."

London, Sept. 30th.—The executive of the amalgamated society of engineers has decided against a strike. Mechanics must, however, refuse work done previously by members of the National Union of railwaymen.

Paris, Sept. 30th.—The Clemenceau Govt. was sustained on a question of confidence in the Chamber of Deputies today. The Premier's demand for postponement of the discussion of the motion of deputy Andrew Lefevre instructing the Govt. to seek the addition of a

rider to the Versailles treaty for the further disarmament of Germany was agreed to by a vote of 226 to 18.

Paris, Sept. 30th.—The French troops that were in Fiume have been evacuating that city for several days, says "La Liberte" today. The operation, it explains was a long one, because of the immense stores of supplies that had to be removed.

Paris, Sept. 30th.—The inflamed conditions in the Adriatic region and the dissolution of the Italian Parliament for the holding of general election on November 16th, as Rome despatches have announced, is giving the Supreme Council much concern, in view of the possibility of all the Balkans becoming involved in the turmoil. In peace conference circles the approaching Italian elections are regarded as a struggle between the war and peace parties, or rather between the forces on the military side and those of Socialistic and Pacific tendencies, while it appears that D'Annunzio and Fiume will be a chief issue. The feeling is growing in Paris that D'Annunzio has acknowledged that his aspirations include far more than Fiume. The Italian situation is daily becoming more of an International question, the view being expressed here that the agitation might flame into war any day if, for instance, a Jugo-Slav should happen to be killed by Italian troops.
