PROCEEDINGS OF THE COLONIAL COUNCIL FOR ST. CROIX.

(Continued from yesterday's Avis.)

Government Secretary (Gaffney) re-
marked: Mr. Chairman. The reason
the Government did not accept the pro-
posal to make a survey of the real and
personal property on the island is because
it would be embarrassing and would
hamper the work of the assessor. This
law provides for a board of valuation,
and we do not expect men who are quali-
fied to sit on such a board without com-
pensation; it would not be fair.

The Chairman remarked: 3rd Member
for Christiansted Town (Alexander)
made a motion that a committee of five
members be appointed.

3rd Member for Christiansted Town
(Alexander): I made a suggestion, not a
motion.

The Chairman: Excuse me, I thought
you made a motion.

1st Member for Frederiksted Country
District (Andersen) remarked: Mr.
Chairman. I would like to raise a ques-
tion to the Government Secretary—We
have heard the Governor make compar-
ison between a small property in Was-
ington and a cattle estate in St. Thomas,
now I wish to ask if the Government has
considered that we are paying a large
export duty on sugar raised on cane es-
tates in St. Croix. That should be taken
into consideration. Eight dollars per ton
export tax on sugar can just as well be
called eight dollars tax per acre on sugar
cane land, because the average recovery

Government Secretary (Gaffney) in re-
ply to the last speaker said,—That mat-
ter has been considered, but the sugar
industry must remember that tax on
sugar is not tax on land. You must also
remember that the Emergency Tariff
Bill provides for \$5.00 per ton.

1st Member for Frederiksted Country
District (Andersen) remarked: Mr.
Chairman. I do not quite understand
the Government Secretary. I understand
that these islands are United States
possessions, and I also understand that
no import duty is collected on articles
entered into the United States from her
possessions.

Government Secretary (Gaffney) re-
marked, Mr. Chairman. To be frank,
I quite agree with the Honorable Mem-
ber that there is no export duty between
the United States and any of its posses-
sions; but there are many questions re-
garding this tax you would be asked to
consider. This is not a tax of revenue
only; we are not discussing whether the
export tax is constitutional or not; such a
tax could be lowered to meet the new
tax on land.

1st Member for Frederiksted Country
District (Andersen) remarked: Mr.
Chairman. I am very much pleased to
hear that from the Government Secre-
tary; it is only through cooperation we
arrive at an understanding where
taxation is concerned. All
