TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Miami, Florida April 3rd.—A southeast

breeze saved the City of Nassau, in the Bahamas, from destruction by the recent fire, which destroyed so many buildings. A number of narrow escapes and spectacular of guest and employes from the hotel are reported, some not being rescued until just before the walls collapsed. The loss is estimated at three million dollars.

Belfast, April 3rd.—Three thousand business men, in private session today, inaugurated a fund for an Ulster programme, as recommended recently by Field Marshal Sir Henry Wilson, former Chief of the Imperial General Staff. The Meeting discussed plans for promoting peace and suppressing crime. Sir James Craig was the principal speaker.

Paris, April 3rd.—The Government has invited the general Federation of Labour to nominate a delegate to the Genoa Conference to advise on technical labour questions and has suggested M Dumoulin one of the secretaries of the Federation. The delegation will be headed by M Barthou.

Vienna, April 3rd.—The Austrian Republic has not officially taken cognisance of the death of the former Emperor, but nevertheless it is believed that the Government will authorize the internment of his body with those of his ancestors in the Capuchin Church.

Paris, April 3rd.—After a discussion on questions concerning the Government's foreign policy, the chamber recorded its confidence in the Poincare ministry by a vote of 484 to 78, this being the first occasion on which the strength of the ministry had been really put to the test. The questions occupied three meetings of the Chamber and touched on the general foreign policy, especially the Washington Conference which many times was qualified as a humiliation for France, the interpellators demanding that the French delegation to the Genoa Conference should not be placed, according to them, in a similar situation to those who attended the Washington Conference.

Washington, April 3rd.—In accordance with a bill adopted by the Senate Immigration Commission, the law restricting Immigration to three per cent has been prorogued for two years, from the first of July next. The Chamber had recently adopted similar bill but proroguing the measure for one year only.

Paris, April 3rd.—The Reparations Commission today approved the agreement relative to deliveries in kind to be made by Germany to Belgium. This agreement negotiated by M Bemelmans, a member of the Belgian Commission, also gives its final approval to the Weisbaden agreement between France and Germany, after adding certain measures thereto.

Berlin, April 3rd.—The Chancellor, Dr Wirth and Dr. Rathenau, Minister for Foreign Affairs, today received Mm Tchitcherine and Litvinoff of the Russian Soviet delegation to the Genoa Conference and informed them that the former Rus-

sian Embassy would be placed at their disposal during their stay in Berlin. This action has caused considerable comment in the press.
