TELEGRAMS

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, October 17th. General Lord Byng who at one time commanded the Canadian army in Flanders, receiving the freedom of Colchester, said, "I have no special qualification. I make no claim to have invented the tank. I make no claim to having written reminiscences in which abuse of one's colleagues form a prominent part. There is the simple fact, 'I have served my country.'"

Chicago, Oct. 17th.—Mr Julius H. Barnes, United States Wheat Director gave public notice last night that he would oppose any attempt to extend to another crop the present Government policy of a guaranteed price on wheat. The announcement was made at a dinner given by the Directors of the Chicago Board of Trade.

London, Oct. 17th.—In a speech at Salford last night Mr. Lloyd George attributed the delay in the conclusion of the Peace Treaty with Turkey to the uncertainty as to the attitude of the United States. It was impossible, he said, to settle the destiny of Turkey before knowing whether the United States was going to share the burdens of civilization outside of the United States. During his reference on Turkey, Mr Lloyd George turned to American Ambassador Davis who was present, and said "I am glad to see that we are brought face to face with the American Ambassador. We are undertaking a great civilization duty at great cost to our country. Providence has sent this mission to our race. We beg our kith and kin in American to join us in this task. Unless they do so, I do not know what will happen to parts of the Turkish

Empire". The Prime Minister in a further reference to Turkey said, "the people of Turkey have been living in that shadow of a great tyranny for centuries. They are appealing to America for help. I hope that the appeal will not be in vain. Such a remark might sound impertinent from a British Minister, but we are undertaking similar responsibilities ourselves and find that we are coming to the limit of our strength and that it is unwise for us to go further."

St. Kitts, Oct. 8th.—Mr. W. E. Veira, prominent merchant of this Island, died here yesterday.

Vienna, Oct. 18th.—The Austrian National Assembly has ratified the peace treaty of St. Germain. The ratification was voted without debate. The German party alone opposed favourable action, that party being a unit in opposition.

London, Oct. 18th.—Henry Irving, the actor-manager, died in London yesterday after a long illness due to a nervous breakdown.

London, Oct. 18th.—Field Marshal Viscount Allenby has been appointed British High Commissioner for Egypt and the Sudan. Viscount Allenby succeeds General Sir R. W. Ngate.

New York, Oct. 18th.—Despite the vote of some of the local unions to return to work the longshoremen's strike continues virtually to tie up the port of New York. Officials of the International Mercantile Marine said that thirty-eight big cargo ships were lying idle and that despite the Union leaders' claims, none of the strike's had returned to work.

Washington, Oct. 17th. The last of the fall amendments to the peace treaty

designed to curtail the power of the American representative on the reparation commission were voted down today by the Senate. There was no roll call on either of the other two amendments, their supporters conceding their defeat and not asking for the naves and ayes.

Berlin, Oct. 18th.—Indignation was expressed by members of the budget commission of the National Assembly when the National Treasury announced the cost of maintaining the Entente armies of occupation and various control commissions would be from 2,500,000,000 to 3,000,000,000 marks annually.

Halifax, Oct. 18th.—It is announced that German emigration societies have acquired in Paraguay and the nearby regions in Northern Argentine extensive land appropriate for colonization by German immigrants. The republics mentioned, it is stated, favoured the acquisition of this land because of their desire for the speedy cultivation of vast undeveloped stretches of country.
