Open Letter to Mr. J. R. Mayhew.

Sir :-

I charge you with spreading libelous literature against Catholic Priests and against The Catholic Church. Your method is foul and mean and entirely foreign to any one who has had even elementary training in the qualities that make up a gentleman. Mud-throwing argues a cause intrinsically weak and it is an insult to an intelligent man to ask him to accept it as an argument. Your method of procedure can never appeal to intelligent, fair-minded men. If you have a cause you deem worthy, let it go before the bar of public opinion on its own merits. Do not strive to establish yourself upon the ruins of other people's characters.

There are two courses open to you: Either desist from this contemptible propaganda or accept my challenge to meet you on a public platform to debate questions covering the field of Dogmatic Theology, Moral Theology, Hermeneutics, Exegesis and Ecclesiastical History.

TELEGRAMS

ST. CROIX STATION.

Ottawa, August 11th.—Embargo on export hides and leather to the United States was passed at urgent insistence of Mr. McFall. The cost of living, the commissioner said, is not likely to be withdrawn despite much trade pressure, it is stated that only the first several similar suggestions made for reduction of the present cost of commodities by conserving Canadian products for home use situation, is a little complex by the fact that in normal times there is both export and import of hides and leather but Mr. McFall thinks that in view of the statement both may be retailing at 20. Some drastic step is necessary in the present manipulation of our market by foreign dealers.

Washington, Aug. 11th.—The Foreign Ministers at Japan would return Kia-chow to China but would have to retain the German Pacific islands because no Japanese Govt. could stand without retaining them. "Did Viscount Ish make any further statement regarding disposition of German claims in China," asked M. Borah, Republican. "No," replied Mr. Lansing, "but you know not that at that time Japan had an understanding with Great Britain for the Japanese control of Kiachow and Viscount Ish concealed it from Mr. Lansing. He said he first heard of secret treaties on the subject between Japan and Great Britain, France, Russia and Italy in February this year at Versailles and he had investigated very thoroughly that these secret treaties were never published."

Bilcrama, Ireland, Aug. 21st.—Associated Press: Gold ingots to value of £10,000 sterling has been recovered by salvors from the wreck of the former White Star Liner "Laurentic" which was sunk on January 28th 1917 off the Fastnet light. The "Laurentic", an auxiliary cruiser, struck a mine off the north coast of Ireland and later sunk. Out of a personnel of 470 only 10 were saved.

Washington, Aug. 11th.—The existence of a secret treaty between Japan and Great Britain regarding the Shantung Peninsula was "cancelled" from Mr. Lansing by Viscount Ishie the Japanese Ambassador to the United States. Mr. Lansing testified today before the Senate and Foreign Relations Committee that on Sept. 6th 1917 he said during negotiations leading up to Lansing-Ishie agreement Viscount Ishie told him that he had assured Sir Edward Grey the British treaty was published by Russia.

London, Aug. 11th.—Lord Rothermel who is regarded as an authority on financial and industrial conditions said on Saturday that he was not pessimistic regarding the outlook for Great Britain in spite of the numerous strikes and labour troubles which we are going through and the teething process after the birth of a new era. He said there are some dark days before us but in twelve months time storms will have been weathered and England will commence to improve her position financially and commercially.

London, Aug. 11th.—Only about fifty miles of the Black Sea Coast remains in the hands of the Bolshevik. The Volunteer army having advanced south and west of Charkov and occupied Or-chakov, 41 miles northeast of Odessa, according to War Office official statement tonight. On the Astrakan front volunteers are advancing and regaining ground lost a few weeks ago, and a thousand enemy deserters have joined the volunteers.

Paris, Aug. 11th.—The Temps says it understands that the Government censorship of telegraphic communications will be suppressed August 15th.
