TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Belfast, July 16th.—The Bunerana Court House, County Donegal, where

the case of Joseph Doherty, Sinn Fein member of Parliament, on a charge of soliciting subscriptions for the Irish Republican Parliament was to be heard was burned this morning, the Court House at Buryfoot which was originally selected for the proceedings also was burned in the morning hours. The authorities are now reported in a quandary as to where the trial is to be held as no Donegal Court House seems safe. The District Council of Moira in the Ulster County of Down, today rejected the appeal of the Larkin Release Committee that it join in efforts to obtain the release of James Larkin, sentenced in the United States to from five to ten years' imprisonment. The Council passed a resolution declaring that Larkin's conviction was just and righteous and the sentence no more than his conduct earned him. A copy of the resolution will be sent to the United States Government.

Sandy Hook, July 17th.—A wind of three knots strength from the northeast was blowing at one o'clock this morning when the crews of the cup sloops began preparations for the day race, weather indication predicted a slow race though Beachcombers said the wind would haul in to the southeast by the time the sloops reached the starting line. A low and aloft on both racers minor weaknesses disclosed in Thursday's struggle have been corrected. Shamrock will not carry in today's race the Nicholson jacket designed to prevent back windage from the main mast. The Cup Committee informed Capt. Burton if the Shamrock carried the jacket in future races she would have to be remeasured. Taking into consideration the trouble of intricate remeasurement and the possibility of adding a few seconds to the Resolute's already large time allowance of six months and forty seconds, Capt. Burton advised her removal of the jacket. Capt. Burton and designer Nicholson said this morning that five races was not an adequate test for the America's Cup. Capt. Burton admits in sailor-man fashion that in a lumpy sea with faint airs the Herreshoff sloop foots faster than the Nicholson craft. Capt. Burton said that in the early stages of Thursday's race Shamrock had out-footed Resolute and was in a position to have crossed her bow when she was struck by a squall and winded off so that when the weather cleared and the wind hauled Resolute found herself well to weather and ahead. Capt. Burton showed two photographs taken from an aeroplane just after the start to show that the challenger was leading. Hickman, navigator of the Shamrock, said the criticisms of Shamrock's start in the first race, was justified in appearance, but that the plan of the start was carried out by a calculation that would have shown its advantages, had not everything been spoiled by the squall. Sir

Thomas is said to have told friends that he will challenge again, if Shamrock IV fails to lift the cup.

London, July 17th.—The French have begun operations in Syria, moving towards Aleppo and Damascus, according to a report printed in the London Times this morning.

London, July 17th.—A threat to drive the Turks from Europe "once and for all" is contained in the Allied reply to the Turkish objections to the peace treaty, made public here today. Such action might follow Turkey's refusal to sign the treaty or her failure to give it effect, the reply states. The time limit for Turkey to make known her decision, expires at midnight, July 27th.

Berlin, July 18th.—(Associated Press). Prince Joachim of Hohenzollern, youngest son of Emperor William, committed suicide today at Potsdam. Joachim is believed to have been in financial straits. He recently was divorced. Later advices say that Prince Joachim shot himself on Saturday in his residence, the Villa Reignitz at Potsdam. He was removed to the St. Joseph's Hospital where he died a few hours later. He has been suffering recently from great mental depression. The only member of the former Imperial family now in Potsdam is Prince Eitel Frederik, the former Emperor's second son.

London, July 18th.—The House of Commons rejected by 130 to 39 the motion to delete Imperial preference from the finance bill.

Sandy Hook, July 18th.—Sir Thomas Lipton plans to take Capt. Burton from the wheel of the cup challenger Shamrock IV. The decision to supplant Capt. Burton as skipper was practically decided upon at a series of conferences today of Sir Thomas Lipton, Capt. Garret representative of the Royal Ulster Yacht Club on board the Resolute, Charles Nichol森 designer of the Shamrock, and Colonel Neill a personal representative of Sir Thomas Lipton on board the Shamrock IV. The yachts will meet again on Tuesday over another triangular course.

London, July 17th.—Johnston and Tilden, the United States Team, won the right to challenge Australia for the Davis Cup the International Lawn Tennis Trophy.
